Kahle Is Sued Over Accident

Rose Schaffers Asks For \$10,500 Over Crash Here on May 10

An action for damages totaling \$10,500 was filed against Carl A. Kahle yesterday by Rose Schaffers, who alleges that she suffered permanent injuries May 10, 1935, in an automobile collision on the 12th street cut-off. The complaint alleges that Kahle's negligence caused the collision with the automobile in which the plaintiff was a guest passenger. She alleges in part that he was not driving on his right side of the road, that he failed to pass the car in which she was riding on the proper side of the road and that when he could see the car was imminent, he failed to use his brakes. As result of the collision, plaintiff says she received a fractured upper jaw, that her teeth and alveolar process were knocked loose, that she suffered a fracture of the lower jaw and other injuries to her teeth and mouth which make it impossible for her to open her mouth more than two-thirds of the normal way and that she also suffered shock and permanent disfigurement. She asks \$10,000 general damages and \$500 special damages.

Rainfall Record For June Broken

A three-year June rainfall record was broken last month when 1.11 inches of precipitation were recorded. The mean average for June here is 1.23 inches and the all-time high, 3.50 inches in 1898, and record low, none, in 1918. June rainfall last year totaled

.36 inch, in 1934 .34 inch, in 1933 .90 inch and in 1932, 1.58 inches. There was 2.35 inches in June, 1931. Eighteen days passed without rainfall last month while the heaviest day's precipitation, .34 inch June 2.
