Chamber Moves to Clean Park Trail

Monmouth Body to Sponsor Picnic to Get Interest in Helmick Clean-up

MONMOUTH, July 6.—The local chamber of commerce will sponsor a sectional picnic to be held at Helmick state park at an unannounced date in order to foster inter-community interest in removing debris from the swimming pool trail in the park.

The park proper, visitors report, is in reasonably good condition, but the path leading to the river is badly choked by flood trash from high water last winter. Logs and other flotsam have become lodged in low parts of the path, and a tractor will be required to remove the debris.

In previous years the state highway department has aided in the cleanup program, and probably will this summer. Interest of communities around Monmouth is necessary to carry the project to completion through the state department.

Carnival Has Deficit
In checking over the receipts of the Goodwill carnival held here in May, a deficit approximating \$300 was reported by the chamber of commerce. More goodwill scrip was redeemed than concessions produced. A special assessment was levied to finance the sum.

A committee made up of F. E. Murdock, C. F. Gillette and Ira C. Powell was appointed to aid in promoting a better business policy for Monmouth, modeled after business organizations of other cities. They will act as a special committee in investigating a sales projects which may be brought to Monmouth by outside soliciting agents.
