McMahon on two charges of owning and operating a slot machine. He was fined \$50 on each of the charges and the two machines were ordered confiscated by the court.

An automobile collision on the Pacific highway at the Chemawa four corners north of Salem yesterday afternoon sent Mary Bandon, 20, of Portland, to Salem General hospital for treatment of painful but apparently not serious injuries. The attending physician last night said her injuries appeared limited to severe bruises.

A light sedan driven by Edward Allen, 1530 South High street, was demolished by the crash. State police said Cecil Stillman Davis, Portland, driver of the other car, admitted a speed of 60 miles per hour as he drove northward. Allen was driving across the highway.

Mrs. E. Miller and Mr. and Mrs. Martin Miller, all of Kansas City, Mo., passengers in the Allen car, and Mrs. C. Davis and William D. Ambrosia, Portland, in the other machine, all escaped injury along with the two drivers.

Counties to Get Hospital Rebate

State Will Settle at \$15 Month For Insane Keep Control Board Says

Settlement of claims against Oregon counties, aggregating \$81,000, for care of non-violent insane patients in the two state hospitals, will be made on the basis of \$15 per patient per month, instead of \$20, the state board of control decided at a meeting Monday.

Officials said this settlement was fair for the reason that \$20 per month was in excess of the actual per capita cost of caring for these patients.

Claims against estates and relatives of non-violent insane patients, contracted prior to March 9, 1935, will be settled on a similar basis. The legislature in 1935 fixed the per capita charge for these patients at \$20 a month.

The law compelling counties to pay the state for care of the non-violent insane patients was repealed at the special legislative session in 1934.

Figures before the board showed that the state collection \$350,000 from relatives and estates of non-violent insane patients during the period 1931 to 1936. Counties paid the state more than \$500,000 up to the time the law was amended in 1934.

The board approved the parole of 10 inmates and discharge of 45 inmates of the state training school for boys.
