Theories on Hay Fever Exploded

Goldenrod Seldom Cause; Some Common Drugs Produce Hives

PORTLAND, July 9.—(AP)—Dr. Ray M. Balyeat, of the University of Oklahoma, exploded a few theories on hay fever, hives and eczema today and offered some others, one of which was that women afflicted with hay fever ought to shun most powder puffs.

The distinguished student of allergic diseases told the Pacific Northwest Medical society convention that orrisroot, used to perfume many kinds of cosmetics, is "one of the commonest causes of hay fever and asthma."

Dr. Balyeat proceeded to knock over a few pet ideas, among them these:

Goldenrod rarely causes hay fever, although most all sufferers and thousands of others, including 40 per cent of the doctors, still think so.

The principal cause in the east is ragweed and in the west grasses and thistle offend. Pretty flowers are not a cause.

Drugs Cause Hives—Aspirin, phenacetin and some of the other most frequently used drugs, including about 57 of the cathartics, frequently induce hives. "If you have hives, try staying away from the medicine chest," he said.

If you suffer from eczema, try putting the geranium outside because plants with fuzzy leaves, including evening primrose, poinsettia, tomato and grape vines, can start that itch.

Ionization of the nose, which has received "much publicity" as a hay fever cure, "is no longer favored." The first choice continues to be inoculation of the patient with various types of pollen to see which reacts.

Sixty to 70 per cent of hay fever sufferers should seek early treatment. "When you protect your nose, you prevent asthma," he said.
