

Nearly 700 Sign up for Learn-to-Swim; May Register Today

First Classes Bring out 556

Newcomers to Be Admitted Today; One Change in Schedule is Made

Registration approached the 700 mark yesterday at the city playgrounds. Red Cross learn-to-swim campaign got under way at Olinger and Leslie pools. The coolness of the day cut first-day class attendance to 556 boys, girls men and women.

Today will be the last opportunity for newcomers to register. Vernon Gilmore, superintendent of city recreation, announced last night. An extension from yesterday was ordered because of the unfavorable weather.

The only change to be made in the class schedule announced late last week will be one for the women's morning swimming class, effective Wednesday at both pools. The women's classes scheduled for 11:30 a. m. to 12 noon will be changed to 11-11:30 a. m., and the beginning class for girls 12 to 14 years of age will take the 11:30-12 period.

Weather is Barrier
The life-saving classes in the afternoon and adult beginning and advanced swimmers groups last night were the least crowded. Gilmore urged interested persons to take advantage of the instruction to be offered in these classes, especially.

"In view of weather conditions, first-day attendance was very good," Gilmore said last night. "But we hope today many more children and adults will join the classes since swimming instruction apparently can not be offered again this excepting during the campaign, which ends July 24. Registration will close Tuesday."

INDEPENDENCE, July 13.—Funeral services for Morgan Ingemannson, who died here Saturday, will be held at the Keeney Funeral home at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday. Rev. Ben W. Davis of the Methodist church will officiate. Interment will be in the L.O.O.F. cemetery.
He was born in Sweden July 1, 1852, and came to America in 1884. He settled in Nevada, where he lived until coming to Polk county in 1888. He was united in marriage to Miss Anne Nelson, Sept. 15, 1888. They lived at Sheridan for 15 years, when they moved to Independence, where the family has since resided. Mr. Ingemannson spent his life in farming. He was a member of the Methodist church.
He is survived by the widow and a daughter and son by a former marriage, Mrs. Jennie McClell, Jr., and Peter Ingemannson of Monmouth. The Ingemannsons raised two other boys, Roy Smith of Canada, and Willard Ingemannson of Banks.

Approval of Oil Plan Little Help

McCann Avers Officers Bet

Three Witnesses Are on Stand First Day of Malfeasance Case

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of having discussed with Sergeant Cutler the case of a WPA worker who had been gambling.
McCann, highway department employee, state witness, related having played poker at Tryon's place "every other day" in 1934-35, "for money . . . very often" and "also at Ed Lytle's."

"How about any other place?" queried Moody.
"It was the same all over town," McCann answered.

McCann then told of the alleged presence of Minto and Cutler at a poker game at Lytle's and of his signing the complaint against Tryon. When he arrived at Tryon's in company with police officers the poker game "wasn't running," he said. He didn't know how long he had played before he left Tryon's and sought the complaint, McCann answered in response to a question by Moody.
"We had been drinking and time goes pretty fast," McCann explained.

Grilled by Custer Ross, third defense attorney, regarding the Tryon complaint, McCann stated the city recorder had asked him about proceeding with the case while he was in Salem testifying before the grand jury.

" . . . but I had to get back on my job," McCann said, declaring he still wished to prosecute Tryon.
McCann, again questioned by Moody, spoke of having with his attorney, Edwin C. Goodenough, negotiated with Tryon and said the latter's attorney was Walter Fahrner.

"Did you at any time while you were away," Ross interposed, "ever direct your attorney, Mr. Edwin C. Goodenough, to have the case set for trial?"
Will Show Gambling Was Conducted Here
"No," McCann answered.
Moody at this point suggested the adjournment.
The prosecution will show "that there was gambling being

conducted in the city . . . and that the chief of police . . . had knowledge of it," Moody said in opening the case.

Defense Lawyer Carson may have indicated the trend of the defense when he pointed out that Salem's form of city government provided for supervision of departments by council committees. He asserted Minto, suspecting gambling had started up in the fall of 1934, unsuccessfully sought to have the council allow him money to hire investigators. Minto had advice from the city attorney and from the district attorney and was warned by a circuit judge that he would be liable to be jailed if he "went into these poker games" which were behind closed doors, Carson averred.

Throughout the afternoon Chief Minto sat quietly between Ross and Winklow, conferring with them occasionally. Mrs. Minto sat nearby, on the front row spectators' bench. Moody sat alone, with the exception of Harry N. Crahn, newspaper man, at his side.

Prosecutor Moody, over defense objections to introduction as evidence of the pleas of guilty made by gambling operators, said he would call them as witnesses.
