Swimmers May Be Short by Three Members if Holm Fails of Results

NEW YORK, July 14.—(AP)—As the zero hour neared for Uncle Sam's athletic army to the 11th Olympic games in Berlin, officials and athletes alike engaged today in one of the greatest dollar-chases in history to assure a full team of 384 men and women when the liner Manhattan departs tomorrow.

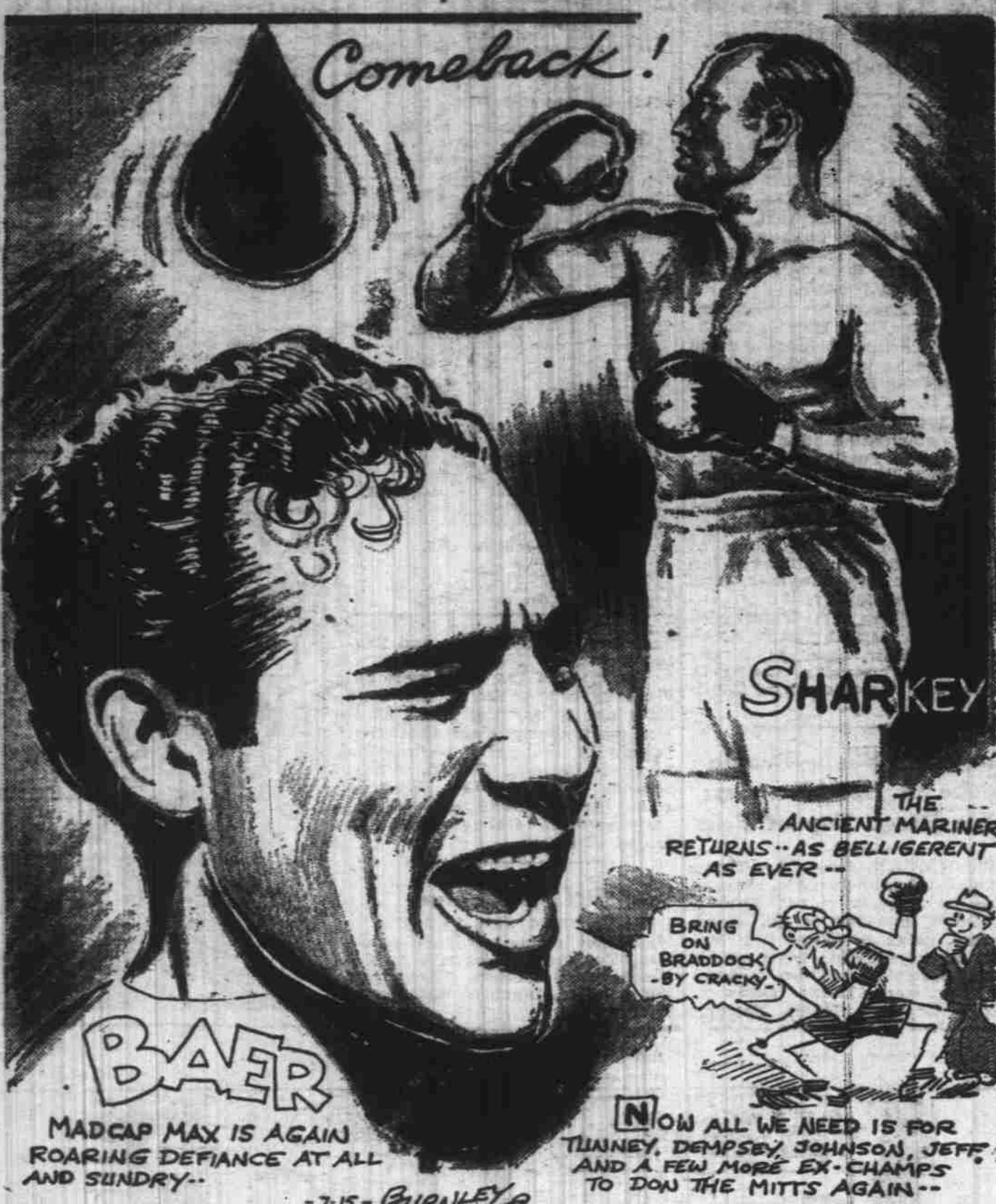
Cannot Break Tie With 4 Overtimes

"Forgot to Duck" Still Reason For Joe Louis Defeat He Says, Denying Reports Sister Said Arm Was "Shot"

DETROIT, July 14.—(AP)—A sister of Joe Louis emphatically denied today a copyright story in the Chicago Evening American quoting her as charging that Louis was given a hypodermic June 20, the day he was knocked out by Max Schmeling in their heavyweight fight in New York.

"I never made any such statement," said Mrs. Enlalie Barrow Gaines, "and there ain't nothing to it at all." Louis and John Roxborough, one of his managers, were equally emphatic in denials of the charge.
