

'Mr. Polly Moran' Is Fighting Talk

Actress Admits That But Husband Picked Wrong Foe; Asks Divorce

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif., July 15.—(AP)—Toward dawn today somebody called Polly Moran's husband "Mr. Polly Moran," and shortly thereafter the chunky, apple-cheeked movie comedienne was looking down the cold blue nose of an automatic pistol and "streamin' bloody murder."

She said her husband, Martin Malone, athletic young lawyer, was holding the gun. He pulled the trigger, the gun jammed. She says she's going to divorce him.

"That 'Mr. Polly Moran' staff was fightin' talk, all right," said the actress. "But Marty didn't have to fight with me."

But he did fight with her, the police blotter showed today. He was fought with two policemen, one of whom unintentionally made matters worse by using the same title.

Uniform Price on Milk Not Purpose

ASHLAND, July 15.—(AP)—The Ashland Tidings quoted Glenn O. Taylor of Medford today as saying the Oregon milk control law, which he was declared to have aided in passing, was not intended to provide a uniform price over the entire state.

Several objections to the fixing of a state-wide price have been voiced the past few days.

The Tidings said Taylor "emphasized that the original intent was to control prices in cases of price wars by district only, not on the basis of one arbitrary price in all districts of the state, regardless of local conditions, as prevails under the recent order."

Explains Effects Of Public Power

Lemke Loses Out In Relief Effort

FARGO, N. D., July 15.—(AP)—Congressman William Lemke, union party candidate for president, failed today in an attempt to have the federal court sustain actions under which ten North Dakota farmers sought relief under farm mortgage moratorium legislation he helped frame.

Judge Andrew Miller, basing his ruling on the decision of the eighth circuit court of appeals holding the amended Frazier-Lemke act unconstitutional, granted motions for dismissal of the ten actions.

Lemke argued that the act does nothing more than federal courts often do in regular bankruptcy proceedings.

The farmers whose actions were dismissed had sought appointment of conciliators who would have made arrangements to extend mortgages for the three-year period to allow opportunity for redemption of the property.

Output of Wheat In Oregon Higher

PORTLAND, July 15.—(AP)—Probability that Oregon's wheat production this year would exceed the 1935 production by 33 per cent and the 1934 production by 64 per cent was shown in figures issued today by the U. S. department of agriculture.

Total estimate, based on the July 1 condition, was 26,600,000 bushels—two per cent less than the 1928-1932 average.

By sections the estimates included:

- Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Lane, Lincoln, Linn, Marion, Multnomah, Polk, Tillamook, Washington, Yamhill counties wheat acreage 152,000, compared with 123,000 in 1934 and 124,000 average 1928-1932; production estimated 4,175,000 bushels, compared with 1,249,000 in 1934 and 2,293,000 average 1928-1932.

Two Killed When House Blown Up

LODI, Calif., July 15.—(AP)—A mother and her 10-year-old son died today after a gas explosion wrecked their home and injured five other occupants, two critically.

The victims were Mrs. Iva Graffigna, 35, whose death followed a caesarian operation deemed necessary because of her injuries, and Paul Graffigna, who succumbed from burns.

Hospital attendants said Mrs. Graffigna's husband, Dave, was dangerously injured. Another child, Anna May Graffigna, 1, was reported in a critical condition.

The four, and three other Graffigna children and a maid were blown through the walls of their home when the gas-filled basement exploded after Paul went to the basement to light a water heater.

Pasturage Good

PORTLAND, July 15.—(AP)—The U. S. department of agriculture reported Oregon pastures in excellent condition today, with plenty of feed for cattle and sheep. The report said hay was damaged by rain and wind in Lincoln, Coos, Curry, Baker and Marion counties.

Zumwalt Unchanged

LONGVIEW, Wash., July 15.—(AP)—The condition of Alva Zumwalt of Salem, injured in an auto accident Sunday, remained unchanged today, hospital attendants said.

Italian Garrison Deemed in Peril

PARIS, July 15.—(AP)—Official French circles expressed some concern tonight over the safety of the Italian garrison in Addis Ababa with the disclosure the French railway from Addis to Djibouti, French Somaliland, has been cut since July 6.

Ferocious close to the situation said the garrison had supplies for less than three weeks when the last train reached Addis Ababa nine days ago.

As soon as the Italians repair breaks in the line the Ethiopians cut in other places, they said.

Motor roads from Eritrea were reported washed out by rain, and airplanes could not land or take off because of heavy mud, cutting off other sources of supply.

Bus Plunges, 5 Hurt

PORTLAND, July 15.—(AP)—A bus plunged into a ditch here today, injuring five WPA workers en route to the Portland airport project.

Cantonese Press Drive Upon Japan

HONGKONG, July 15.—(AP)—Stubborn southwestern Chinese, flouting central government discipline, pressed an anti-Japanese crusade on two fronts tonight.

Canton government officials sought to force a new session of the Kuomintang central executive committee to order war against Japan. The committee, in a meeting which ended at Nanking last night, rebuked southern leaders and dissolved the southwest executive committee of the party.

An "Anti-Japanese Allies Headquarters" was established at Canton with General Chan Chal-Tong, discharged as Kwangtung Province commander-in-chief by the National Kuomintang conference, in charge.

Ironically, it was reported, Canton has bought 300 new airplanes from Japan.

Rogers Will Head Spanish War Vets

THE DALLES, July 15.—(AP)—The United Spanish war veterans of Oregon selected Hugh S. Rogers of Hillsboro commander today and chose Medford as the convention city for 1937.

Mrs. Millie Hall, Eugene, was named president of the auxiliary. Delegates voted to launch a drive to bring the 1938 national encampment to Portland.

Other officers chosen by the veterans' organization included Sam S. Hanson, Portland, senior vice commander, and E. R. Leedy, McMinnville, junior vice commander.

Wray Wins by Five Vote Margin in Contest For Eagles Lodge Secretary

SILVERTON, July 15.—Frank Wray defeated R. J. Baldwin by only five votes in a race for secretary of the Eagles lodge at Silverton Tuesday night.

W. E. Russel was elected president, H. R. Burk vice-president, Guy Morley chaplain, Walter Magnus guard, George Manolis trustee for three years.
