### Nonsuit Given Accident Case

**Trial Ends as Plaintiff's Case Completed; Suit For Divorce Filed**

Motion for nonsuit was granted yesterday by Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan in the trial of Camborus vs. State Industrial Accident Commission. The motion came at the conclusion of plaintiff's testimony. The action was an appeal from an award of the commission for partial disability.

Divorce action against William A. Rentscher was filed in circuit court yesterday by E. M. P. Rentscher. Based on grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment, the complaint states that the defendant swore at the plaintiff, threatened her life and embarrassed her by making false accusations.

The couple were married at Great Falls, Montana, September 1924. There are two minor children of whom the plaintiff asks custody. She seeks \$50 a month support money, \$25 suit funds and \$250 attorney's fees. A one-third interest in extensive property is requested and delivery of all the defendant's household goods.

### Houses on Route Of Highway Sold

PORTLAND, Ore., July 17.—(AP)—The state highway commission sold 11 houses today, at an average price of \$160, in connection with plans to construct a super-highway from East Portland to Oregon City. Individuals and engineering companies bought the residences at prices ranging from \$46.50 to \$385.

Other actions of the commission: Approved the request of the Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers to build a memorial to "pioneer state drivers" at the bridge crossing Paradise creek on the Umpqua highway between Elkton and Scottsburg; granted the Clatsop County Log Haulers' association the right to increase speed limit of trucks on the Coast highway south of Seaside from 25 to 35 miles an hour.

### Haying, General Farm Jobs Open

Seasonal employment has tapered off to a routine call for hay and general farm hands, Manager D. D. Dotson of the state employment office reported yesterday. Fruit picking here and in the Gresham berry district is all but ended, he said, and bean picking in the Stayton and Weston districts is not expected to begin for a week and a half. Daily calls for farm and hay hands average around nine and the same for construction work, Dotson said.

### To Let Contract On Ward Building

Identity of the successful bidder for the contract to construct the new Montgomery Ward and Company three-story department store building at 181-171 North Liberty street should be known here sometime next week, City Building Inspector E. C. Bushnell predicted yesterday. Bids will be opened in the company's construction department offices at Chicago Monday.

The building will have a 62 1/2 foot frontage and extend back 180 feet toward the alley. There will be a full basement, mezzanine and three main floors, the top one for storage purposes. Construction will meet the city's requirements for structures classed as fully fireproof.

Grilled windows, ornamental metal work, a sidewalk marquee and offset third floor front with dormer windows are noted on the plans. Cost is estimated at \$125,000.

### Hops Transferred Here at 30 Cents

Hop markets continued moderately active here yesterday with 111 bales of the 1935 crop sold at 30 cents and 26 bales of poorer quality going at 25 cents. No new contracts were reported.

The 30 cents figure is the top price that has been paid for Oregon hops. Growers are offering some of the light remaining supplies at prices ranging from 32 to 35 cents but to date buyers have refused to go above the price registered yesterday.

Improving conditions continued to be favorable with new vines appearing in most of the yards. Hop men are divided over the possibility of the new growth producing hops. Practically all yards are now blooming with some reports coming in that blight is destroying some blossoms.

### Church Deplores Liquor Situation

EUGENE, July 17.—(AP)—Passage of vigorous resolutions concerning liquor and motion pictures at the concluding sessions of the Presbyterian Synod of Oregon here today.

Delegates went on record condemning the "present liquor conditions in our state" and the "continued production of motion pictures that are including, vicious and sensual suggestive, vicious and sensual suggestive. Pendleton was chosen the convention city of 1937. Dates will be set later.

Dr. Thomas W. Bibb, president of Albany college, was given a certificate of confidence for his administration of the institution. It was decided a committee of eight would make a study of the school. Delegates voted to support an international movement for a mandate to governments against liquor in addition to expressing opposition to compulsory military training in schools.

### Related Bonds to Arrive Wednesday

PORTLAND, Ore., July 17.—(AP)—The Oregonian's—Washington correspondent said tonight bond issues will be sent to 2,300 Oregon veterans next Wednesday, as a result of a ruling by the comptroller general.

The correspondent said the bonds held up were those of veterans who had deposited their compensation certificates as security for loans made them by a Portland bank and that the delay was occasioned by the difference in routing necessitated.

It also was reported that a similar situation held up bonus bonds to many veterans in other states.

**Paper Company's Earnings Higher**  
PORTLAND, July 17.—(AP)—The Crown Willamette Paper company said today the firm and its subsidiaries showed an increase in consolidated net profit of 33 per cent for the fiscal year ending April 30, 1936. Net earnings were increased by \$1,241,279 and current assets aggregated \$10,456,388, or 2.8 times current liabilities.
