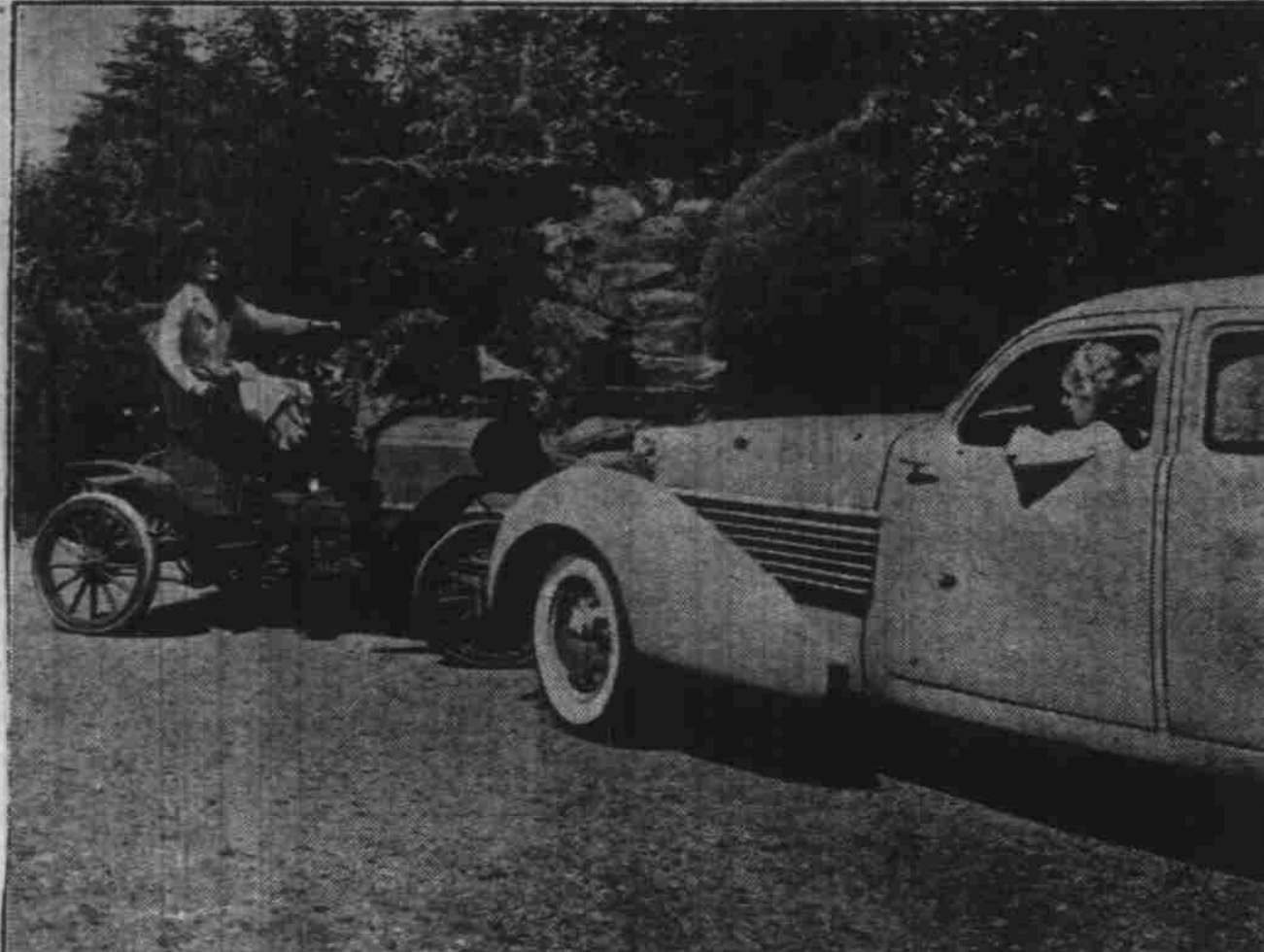

### Home Exemption Effort Renewed

The home owners tax exemption league filed a preliminary initiative petition Saturday to exempt homes of a cash value up to \$2,000 from taxation.

The initiative, if completed, will be voted upon in 1938. The number of signatures necessary cannot be determined until after this year's general election. The initiative could not get on the November ballot because the time had been closed.

The measure is similar to those filed by the organization twice before, neither time, however, had the initiative been completed. The new phase to this proposal is an additional surtax of personal incomes to take up the difference in the exemption.

The surtax will start with salaries of \$2,000 a year or better. The schedule calls for a 2 per cent tax on incomes of from \$2,000 to \$2,500; 4 per cent from \$2,500 to \$3,000; 7 per cent on salaries from \$3,000 to \$4,000; 12 per cent from \$4,000 to \$5,000; 20 per cent from \$5,000 to \$7,000; 34 per cent from \$7,000 to \$15,000; 5 per cent from \$15,000, and all salaries above \$15,000 would be taxed 70 per cent.

### Police, Civilians Unite in Manhunt

Citizens and officers alike took up the chase yesterday forenoon when a man grabbed two purses from an automobile parked at 656 University street, and fled. #### Howard Street Hill to Be Scene of Event; Three Enter at Portland

A wide variety of articles such as a boy might want will be awarded as prizes to winners in the soapbox derby to be staged on the Howard street hill near Leslie swimming pool at 2 p. m. Friday, Vernon Gilmore, city superintendent of recreation, announced yesterday. The grand prize, for best all around soapbox, will be four "soapmobile" car wheels.

The contest, a branch of the national derby, will be divided into four age divisions, 9 to 12 years, and 13 to 15 years, general competition; 9 to 12 years and 13 to 15 years, special judging. In the first two divisions there will be four prizes each. Prizes in the third and fourth divisions will be given for best constructed soapbox car, most trim car and most unusual car.

The first three winners in each division will be given a trip to Portland to enter the contest there August 1 by Douglas McKay of Salem. Their participation in the Portland derby will be permitted if their cars can qualify after they arrive there.

The local derby is being supervised by the city playground staff. Gilmore is considering adding a six-block bicycle race to the program.
