

Effort Renewed

The home owners tax exempion league filed a preliminary initiative petition Saturday to exempt homes of a cash value up to \$2,000 from taxation.

The initiative, if completed, will be voted upon in 1938. The number of signatures necessary cannot be determined until after this year's general election. The initiative could not get on the November ballot because the time had been closed,

The measure is similar to those filed by the organization twice before, neither time, however, had the initiatives been completed. The new phase to this proposal is an additional surtax of personal incomes to take up the difference in the exemption
