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Three Divorce Suits Started

Claims Over Custody, Two Children Are Filed in Yet Another Case

Marital disputes kept court clerks busy yesterday as three new divorce cases were filed and motions and counter motions were filed for the custody of two children by a divorced couple.

Andrew L. Peterson filed a motion for custody of two boys, 8 and 10 years old, given to Iola C. Peterson at the time divorce papers were granted. In support of his motion Peterson alleged in an affidavit that his former wife was an unfit person to have care of the children, that she neglected the two boys by leaving them alone at nights and by not taking care of them when ill.

Answering the motion for custody of the children, Mrs. Peterson filed an affidavit declaring that Peterson had failed to pay the \$15 a month support money awarded to her for care of the children. She asked in her motion that he be cited for contempt of court.

Cruel and inhuman treatment was charged in a divorce complaint against Harold D. McGraw by Helen McGraw. The couple were married in Spokane in June 1931. There are no children nor property rights involved in the suit. The plaintiff asks for possession of an automobile, household furniture and personal effects and for the return of her maiden name, Helen Shaw.

Divorce action was started by Jay S. Brown against Libby Brown on grounds of desertion. The Browns were married in Vancouver in October 1932. There are no children of the marriage. Desertion was also charged by H. D. Grant in a suit against Phyllis D. Grant. They were married in 1925 and lived in Vancouver in 1932. The complaint asks that the defendant's maiden name, Phyllis Dorothy Myers, be restored.

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School Buildings At Halfway Point

Report on Expenditure Is Made by Accountant For Big Project

The Salem school building program in point of expenditures is nearly one-half completed, according to the monthly financial statement issued yesterday by Lee S. Ross, school board accountant. In district and federal grant funds, \$468,300.34 has been spent out of a total estimated expenditure of \$1,096,737.64. The total estimate does not include site, equipment and architectural expense for which the district will receive no matching grant money. The district to date has received \$233,377.22 in federal grant funds and expects to receive at least \$192,486.78 more from this source. Applications for additional grants are pending.

Outgo Itemized
Ross' report deals with three projects as follows:
Senior high expenditures: Expended to date, \$266,491.85; estimated total expenditure, \$718,608.82; federal grant to date \$154,784.44; total grant approved, \$278,612.
Leslie Junior high additions: Expended to date, \$107,272.49; estimated total expenditure, \$208,056.99; federal grant to date, \$48,092.78; total grant approved, \$92,352.
Grade school—Expended to date, \$94,536.89; estimated total expenditure, \$169,936.32; federal grant to date, \$30,500; total grant approved, \$54,900.
The three projects will cost the school district \$668,737.64 in actual construction outlays.
