School District Chooses
Director in Close
Election Race

INDEPENDENCE, July 22.—Dr. George C. Knott was elected to the school board for district No. 29 at a special meeting held on Monday night, July 20, at the training school. Mr. Z. C. Kimball nominated Dr. Knott and Mr. B. Winn nominated Mr. Bert Keller. The race was close, Knott receiving 142 votes to Keller's 125 votes.

Knott is the third new member on the Independence board. Mr. A. W. Foster was elected at a regular school meeting on June 15 to fill the vacancy of Mr. E. A. Duncell, retiring member; two weeks prior to the general election Mr. J. E. Kelley, director, resigned, and on June 29, at a special meeting Mr. Valen Guld was elected to fill Kelley's one year unexpired term. On July 2, Mr. W. T. Hoffman, chairman of the board, resigned leaving an unexpired term of two years, which Dr. Knott was elected to fill.

Knott has had considerable experience, being on the local board about ten years ago, and also serving on the school boards at Yoncalla and Glendale.
