

Thongs Hear Landon Accept

Benefits to Farmer and Relief When Needed Among Pledges

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Once all this consumer demand is released, the problem will be not where to find work for the workers, but where to find workers for the work.

"We must be freed from incessant governmental intimidation and hostility. We must be freed from excessive expenditures and crippling taxation. We must be freed from the effects of an arbitrary and uncertain monetary policy. And, through a vigorous enforcement of the anti-trust laws, we must be freed from private monopolistic control.

"Once these things are done, the energies of the American economic system will remedy the ravages of depression and restore full activity and full employment."

The nominees both began and ended his address with references to the constitution. At the start he said the nomination was accepted "with a full understanding of the meaning" of the president's constitutional oath "to preserve, protect and defend the constitution."

At the close he said that "if I am elected chief executive of this nation I propose to restore our government to an efficient as well as constitutional basis."

Worst Economic at Expense of Needy

Landon said relief of the unemployed "until recovery is attained" was "a matter of plain duty." He added:

"Let me emphasize that, while we propose to follow a policy of economy in government expenditures, those who need relief will get it. We will not take our economies out of the allotments of the unemployed. We will take them out of the hides of the political exploiters."

Landon said that even before its invalidation, "the triple-A was rapidly disorganizing American agriculture," and that "the loss of markets, both at home and abroad, far outweighs the value of all the benefits paid to farmers."

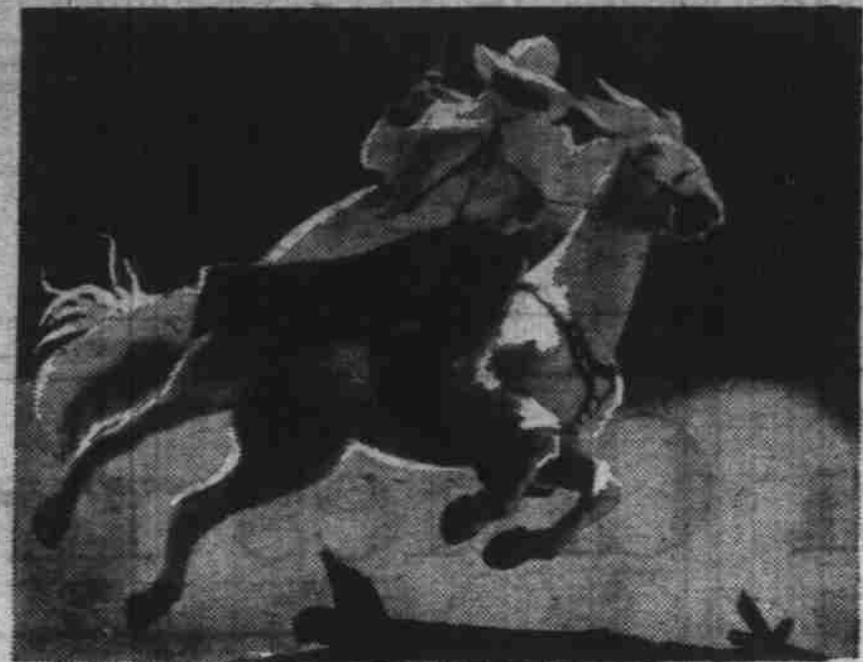

ministration, through its program of scarcity, has gambled with the needed food and feed supplies of the country. It overlooked the fact that Mother Nature could not be regimented.

Proposes to Protect Farmers of Nation

Landon said that until disadvantages arising from world disorder are eliminated, "we propose to pay cash benefits in order to cushion our farm families against the disastrous effects of price fluctuations and to protect their standard of living." Also, he pledged "every reasonable assistance" to drought area producers.

"The right of labor to organize," Landon said, "means to me the right of employees to join any type of union they prefer, whether it covers their plant, their craft or their industry. It means that, in the absence of a union contract, an employer has an equal right to join a union or to refuse to join a union."

In international affairs, Landon said his party would "take every opportunity to promote among the nations a peace based upon justice and human rights" but would join no plan taking away independence of judgment or which "might involve us in a war in the beginning of which we had no part."

Landon told his listeners both in Topeka and throughout the nation that he touched "only upon a few phases" of his program and would discuss others in detail as the campaign progressed.

"The time has come to pull together," he said. "If we are to go forward permanently it must be with a united nation—not with a people torn by appeals to prejudice and class feeling."

words "now owned" in the description of the premises upon some portion of which the capitol building is required to be constructed, is that they are words used to identify in part the premises upon which such building is to be constructed.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 23.—(AP)—The Oregon state capitol commission went on record today favoring the use of Oregon granite and marble in the new statehouse at Salem and laid plans to bring about the start of excavation work by September 19.

It was determined to use native material unless stone of "equal" quality can be obtained more cheaply. It also was decided to use Oregon walnut for the major portion of the woodwork.

Commissioners T. H. Banfield and George H. Marshall reported "very satisfactory granite material" was found on visits to eastern Oregon and Ashland quarries. Marble and lime deposits in commercial quantities were found near Enterprise.

The commissioners also determined today to award a contract for the entire structure, rather than for separate contracts for plumbing, heating and other items.

Specifications Must Be Presented Soon

The group was informed specifications for the excavation, removal of trees, building of a work zone fence and construction of offices for architects must be presented to the public works administration by August 1.

Ralph Moody, deputy attorney general, read an attorney general's opinion that the new statehouse may extend westward onto a portion of Willson park.

Changes in design suggested by the capitol commission and by Oregon associates of the New York architects include wood doors and door jams instead of metal and the placing of an open lobby between the senate and house chambers, eliminating the previously-planned reception rooms. The suggested changes will be offered to Trowbridge & Livingston and Francis Keally, holders of the architectural contract.

On motion of Commissioner Olinger, the group adopted a plan to pay \$100 bonus for each day the capitol is completed ahead of schedule and penalize a similar amount for "overtime."

Britain's Monarch Held 'Despicable'

LONDON, July 24.—(Friday)—King Edward VIII was called "a despicable individual" in one of the stormiest and longest sessions of parliament before approval was voted early today to the Baldwin government's new unemployment assistance regulations.

Three of the four members of the independent labor party, whose outbursts against the British royal family have created several uprisings in parliamentary sessions in the past few days, were voted out of their seats temporarily.

Stocky Jack McGovern, who heckled the late King George in parliament in 1933, had to be led from his seat by a guard carrying the traditional sword after he criticized the present monarch and called home secretary Sir John Simon "a damned liar."

Campbell Stephen, who called Simon "a dirty little rat," and George Buchanan, who joined his radical group in denouncing Simon and government supporters, stalked from the house in high dudgeon after their suspension was voted.

"Tuesday, July 21. Please give to coast guard, Help. Crashed on reef at Matecumbe. Please send help. Wireless broken."

Officials made out the signature which was almost illegible, as "Captain of Nanoca."
