Crash Damage Case Is Filed

Michigan Accident Causes Permanent Injury Is Claim of Pearce

Action for \$25,000 damages was filed against Victor Rodell in circuit court yesterday by Robert Pearce. Damages were asked for injuries allegedly sustained in an automobile accident on the Eau Claire highway in Michigan, October 13, 1935.

Pearce states in his complaint that he was walking along the highway when a car driven by Rodell came out of a side road and failed to stop and struck him. He asserts that the shock and injuries he received will be permanent. Pearce is 20 years old. The complaint was filed by Roy Harlan, guardian ad litem, for a minor.

A foreclosure complaint against Charles J. Lehman and others was filed by the Home Owners Loan corporation. The suit is for collection of a \$2530 note and asks that a receiver be appointed to maintain the property during pendency of the action.

Federal Fund For Aged Is \$472,500
WASHINGTON, July 24.—(AP)—Oregon will receive \$472,500 in federal aid to finance the state's old-age assistance program for the quarter July 1 to Sept. 30, under authorization announced today by the social security board.

The amount represented 50 per cent of the total to be spent plus 5 per cent for administrative costs.

The board said that was estimated Oregon would spend \$900,000 for the quarter and that with 13,000 persons eligible the average amount of aid would approximate \$25 each.

The allotment, second to be granted Oregon since the state's old-age assistance program was approved, brought to \$462,250 the total granted the state to match its own expenditures from April 1 to Sept. 30.

The board said federal assistance has enabled the state to gradually extend its program to a larger number of persons.

Last year, 5,070 were being aided and by June, 1936, the number had increased to 9,459.

Factory Seeks to Enjoin Picketing
PORTLAND, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—The Superior Manufacturing company filed suit in circuit court today seeking to bar picketing of its plant and claiming that two employees have been beaten. Defendants are the Furniture Workers' union, the Upholsters' union and officials of the two unions.
