

Cooperative Grain Warehouse is Completed at Independence

Work Finished On New Plant

\$10,000 Structure Built For Monmouth Firm; Machinery Ordered

INDEPENDENCE, July 25.—Monmouth cooperative's \$10,000 modern grain warehouse was completed this week. The building is the property of the Monmouth Cooperative Creamery and Warehouse company. It is located on Third street by F and G streets. Contract for the structure was given to Cecil Price of the Price Lumber company of Monmouth. W. B. Kanne of Independence was construction foreman.

Dimensions Given

The building extends about 50 feet on Third street and runs back toward the railway for about 50 feet. The building is 40 feet wide, 50 feet long and 30 feet high. It is elevated 10 feet from the ground and in the center has an elevator to hoist grain to the top, where it will go into railway cars. There are 15 bins of 3000 bushels capacity constructed.

Machinery has been ordered and will be installed soon, making the building complete and ready for business about August 1.

Contest to Choose Flax Queen Starts

MT. ANGEL, July 25.—The contest to select the queen for Mt. Angel's first flax festival to be held in September started today. Girls from Mt. Angel, Monitor, Marquam, Scotts Mills, or the surrounding communities are eligible.

The winner will be decided by popular vote, each purchase of ten cents entitling the purchaser to one vote. After the first week all but the 25 highest rating contestants will be discarded. Albany Has Large Sum in Treasury

ALBANY, July 25.—City Recorder P. E. VanTassel's report for the second quarter of the year shows that Albany has \$14,319.16 in the treasury after all operating costs had been paid. The report was made at the meeting of the city council.

Total expenditures were \$36,767.45, the largest part of which was in general fund warrants and amounted to \$25,329.94. New warrants issued during the quarter totaled \$17,543.83.

Outstanding warrants were reduced from \$42,120.39 unpaid at the close of the first quarter, to \$27,929.55 at the close of the quarter ending June 30. This leaves the net indebtedness, exclusive of fixed assets, at \$121,449.92.

Fire Chief Butts' report showed 117 fire permits issued during the first half of the year. During the month eight fire alarms were answered, two of which were false. Total damage by fire was \$25, covered by insurance.

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Simpson Family Elects Officers

ZENA, July 25.—At the election of officers held at the annual reunion of the clan of William and Mary Simpson, who crossed the plains in 1846 from Platte county, Missouri, to Oregon, John Simpson of Amity was made president when the incumbent, Mrs. W. N. Crawford resigned. Mrs. Everett Service, secretary treasurer succeeded Mrs. J. Clyde Simpson of Swegle, resigned, who organized the reunions. Mrs. Clyde Bliven of Portland is clan historian and has collected valuable early history of the Simpson family.

William Simpson was a circuit rider and the first Baptist minister in Salem, and officiated at the first marriage on record at the Marion county courthouse. Benjamin Simpson, eldest son of the pioneer family built one of the first sawmills on the Clackamas river and maintained one of the first stores in Clackamas county. In 1852 he moved to Salem where he spent several years.

Benjamin Simpson built the old settlers' store at Fort Yamhill and constructed the old Newport road to haul lumber over the mountains. He was selected to second territorial legislature and elected to represent Marion county in the house. At the beginning of the Civil war he was representative from Polk county and in 1872 was elected in the same capacity from Marion county.

James B. Simpson, 79, of Swegle, formerly of Salem, was the oldest member of the clan present. He is the son of David Simpson, son of William and Mary Simpson. Little Alice Catherine Haldeman, three months old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Haldeman of Zena was the youngest person present. She is the granddaughter of Mrs. W. N. Crawford (Lois Simpson), daughter of Charles Simpson who was a brother of James B. Simpson.
