One Killed in Auto's Plunge

War Veteran Is Victim on Detroit Road; Several Injuries Reported

An automobile plunge over an embankment on the Salem-Detroit highway near Niagara late Saturday afternoon took the life of Samuel Chamblin, 68, who was on leave, with Hubert Turenne, from the veterans' hospital. Chamblin died en route to the Stayton hospital. Turenne was not seriously hurt.

Other weekend automobile accidents resulted in a fractured leg for Stewart Wheeler Van Scoyoc, 3 1/2, of 533 Statesman street, and a cut lip for Mrs. D. L. Clark, route seven.

The Van Scoyoc boy, according to a report to police, ran into the side of an automobile driven by Henry Loewen, 1242 Ruge street, West Salem, on State street in front of the First Methodist church at 11 a. m. Sunday. His condition, the attending physician reported last night, is not serious.

Mrs. Clark was injured when automobiles driven by T. J. Kerns, route seven, and Joas H. Kauffman, Lebanon route three, collided at High and Center streets at 9 a. m. Sunday.

The accident on the Salem-Detroit highway Saturday occurred at a sharp turn near the Albert Millisap place. The veterans' automobile left the roadway and dropped 20 feet. Chamblin, a veteran of the Spanish American and World wars, will be accorded a military funeral in Portland.

Garden Operated, Commercial Scale

Turning vacant city lots into a garden producing on a commercial scale is the record of Fred I. Sanford at 2020 Myrtle street, in the Hollywood section of Salem. In a portion of the lot adjoining his residence and on another leased lot, Sanford has 2000 tomato plants now coming into full production.

It is a veritable field of tomato plants tied to neat stakes, and there is an abundance of tomatoes setting on the vines. Already Sanford has been marketing many boxes, selling wholesale to one market. The variety is an improved Burbank, from seed of Sanford's own raising. While most of the ground is in tomatoes there is a fringe of green peppers and sweet corn, and on the street side many rows of beautiful flowers.

Sanford is experienced in the culture of vegetables and flowers, having operated greenhouses in the Bitter Root valley. If his present undertaking proves successful he may enlarge his operations.

Blakely Recovers From Bad Wounds

Former Restaurant Man Is Reported in Attempt to Take Own Life

John Blakely, former Salem restaurant proprietor whom Portland police reported attempted to commit suicide Friday morning, was released from Good Samaritan hospital there yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Blakely was said to have made his suicide attempt in his apartment in Portland where he was found by the manager of the establishment. He had slashed both wrists and his neck with a large knife and had battered at his head with a hammer.

He was given first aid by an emergency physician and taken to a Portland hospital.

Mr. and Mrs. Blakely came to Salem in 1930 and acquired the Gray-Belle restaurant which they ran for several years. Later they went to Gardiner, Douglas county, Oregon, and conducted the Gardiner Tavern. After selling that establishment they removed to Portland.

Had Poor Health
For years Mr. Blakely had suffered from poor health. Physicians diagnosed his ailment as a dropsical condition which produced long periods when he would sleep deeply and resist all attempts to arouse him.

At the time he made his attempt to end his life, Mrs. Blakely was in a hospital recovering from an operation. He is 57 years old. Before engaging in the restaurant business he was a salesman many years for a nationally known cigar concern.
