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Crash Damage Suit Is Filed

Susan Shepherd Says Scar Caused; Paper Firm's Case Is Settled

Damages of \$1518 were asked in a complaint filed in circuit court yesterday by Susan Shepherd against Curra Dulaney. The action is based on injuries allegedly received in an automobile accident April 6 at the corner of High and Ferry streets. The plaintiff was the guest of the defendant in one of the cars which collided.

In her complaint, the plaintiff states that the defendant had reason to believe that the car was not going to stop at the intersection and that the defendant had time to avoid the collision. She states that she was thrown against the top of the car and received cuts and bruises, which resulted in a permanent scar.

Stipulation of settlement has been filed in the case of Blake Moffitt & Towne against the Press Publishing company in which judgment is given to the plaintiff for \$1000 in payment of a press. Execution on the judgment is not to be taken until August 15. The case had been set for trial tomorrow before Judge Arlie G. LaNair Case Will Be Argued Today

Art Department In Own Building

Exhibit at Fair Will Be On Ground Floor For First Time Now

The Oregon state fair art department has struck the ground this year and in so doing has brought an important change to this phase of the state fair exhibits for the Diamond Jubilee fair to be held here September 7 to 13. For the first time, the art department will occupy a building of its own and will be found on a ground floor.

The new art building will not only give this department a better location but will also afford better lighting and ventilation. It will occupy the structure between the poultry and agricultural pavilions, and with an 18-foot extension to the present building there and an additional room to be used for receiving and sending out displays, will provide adequate quarters for this important part of the fair.

Is Being Rebuilt—Present building is under way, with the second story floor cut through to provide a gallery or mezzanine floor to permit display of the paintings and photographic art to the greatest advantage. Attention is also being given to special lighting effects for the art exposition.

The art department will be in charge of Mrs. Lotta Smith of Salem again this year, with William Ball of Corvallis directing the photographic art division of the display.

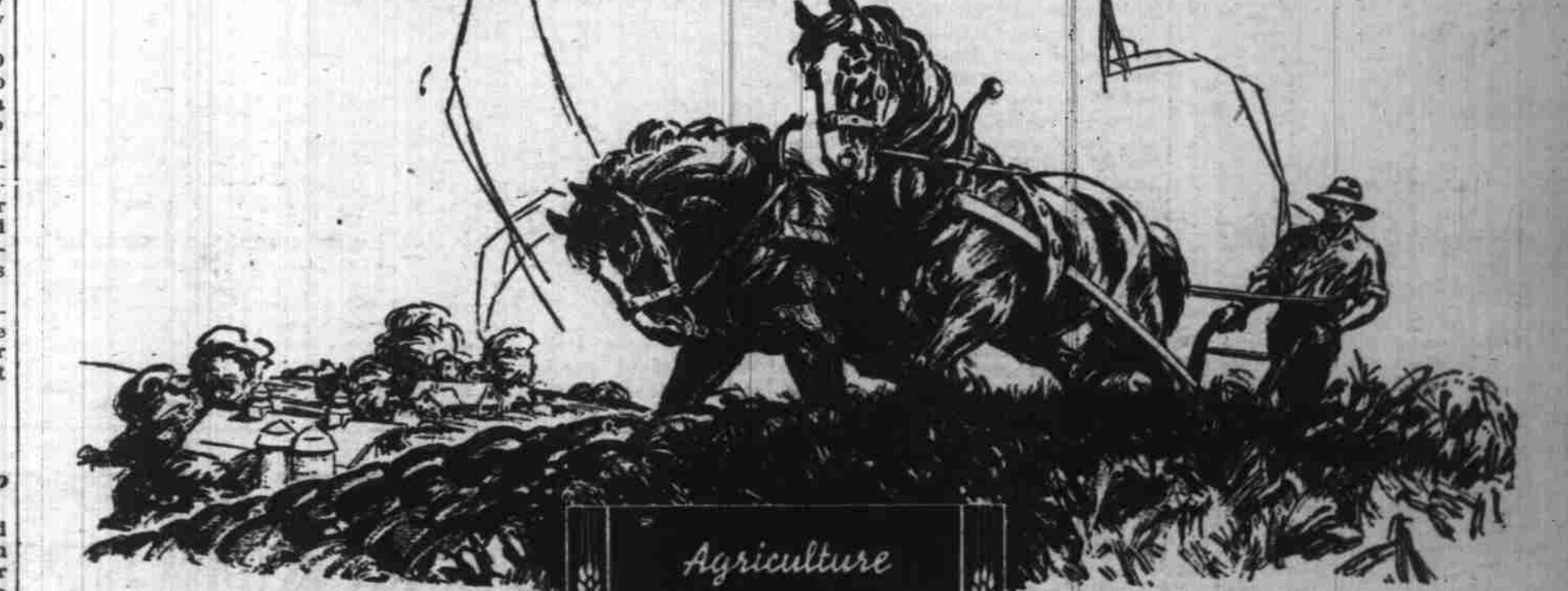
