

California-Florida Battle Seen in London-Burns Mat Event

Rival Climate Claims Upheld

"Cry Baby" Must Undergo Search Before Going Into Ring Tonight

As everyone knows who reads summer resort and travel advertising, there is no love lost between California and Florida. Each claims to have "the climate" and there is constant warfare over the relative merits of those two sections of the United States where anything except sunshine is "unusual."

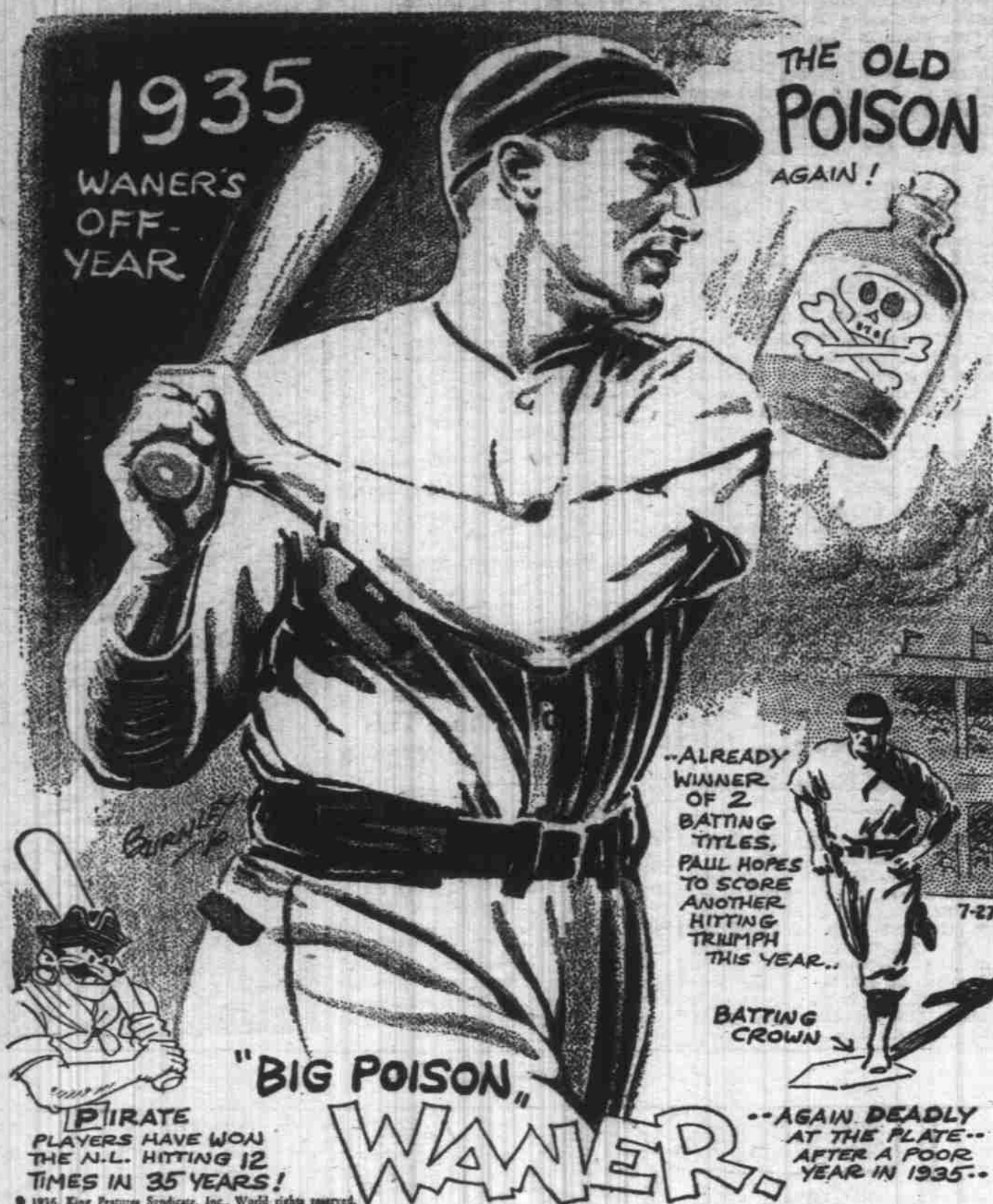

HERE'S the picture:
The scene is any ball park in which the Pittsburgh Pirates happen to be playing. At the plate, waving his bat occasionally with a rhythmic motion, is a mild-looking fellow, comparatively small and slight, as ball players go, but with the suggestion of latent power in his compactly built frame.
The pitcher, poised on the hill, suddenly twists himself into those curious gyrations known as a "wind-up," then uncoils, and the gleaming white horseshoe sphere zizzes home-ward. The rifle-like crack of ball meeting bat is the next sound we

hear, then the roar of the crowd as the batter circles first and slides safely into second.
Over the wires, the reporters send out a staccato sentence telling an old story once more: "Waner doubles to right."
They call this deadly marksman of the bat "Poison Paul," and National League hurlers are unanimous in declaring the title well deserved. The Walloping Waner from Smoketown, whose brother Lloyd is also bad medicine to the moundmen, is having one of his good years again.
Not that he has had many bad

seasons—last year was the only off year Paul has suffered since coming up to the big time, and at that he hit over .350, which would be a fine mark for anyone but Mister Waner.
The Pirate pounder, who bagged the National loop hitting championship in 1927 and 1934, is after his third smacking title, and it will be no surprise if he comes through.
Incidentally, Pittsburghers seem to have a penchant for copping the batting crown. Twelve wearers of the Pirate uniform have led the National League hitting parade in the past 35 years.

CHICAGO, July 27. — (AP) — Jay Berwanger, Riley Smith, Paul Tangora and Dick Smith, whose exploits brought them all-American honors, and seven other star players who contributed to 1935's college gridiron history, will oppose the professional champion Detroit Lions in the annual all star battle under floodlights at Soldier field Sept. 1.
The four great stars, Berwanger of Chicago, Tangora of Northwestern, and the Smiths, Alabama's Riley and Minnesota's Dick, along with Wayne Miller of Notre Dame, Keith Topping of Stanford, Truman Saph of Southern Methodist, Vern Oech, another Minnesota great, Ohio State's Gomer Jones, Bill Shakespeare of Notre Dame, and still another Minnesota star, Sheldon Belso, were named by the country's fans, 3,419,164, of them, to start against the Lions.
To back up the first eleven, the Chicago Tribune, sponsor of the event, has invited 53 others who flashed high in the voting, to be some members of the west. Each member of the prospective starting front has accepted.
The all star squad, each member of which finished inter-collegiate competition with the end of the 1935 season, will report for the opening workout at Northwestern university August 13.

Summers, painfully injured in the grain, lay in a hotel room, unable to accompany his fellow umpires on their trip to St. Louis, where he was to have officiated in the series between the Browns and the Boston Red Sox starting today.

The guilty assailant, one of scores of enraged fans who threw missiles at all three umpires during the eighth inning of the final game, which like the first also was won by the Yankees, was sought with an unprecedented reward in an effort to make an example out of him.

As a result of the demonstration, the commissioner indicated he may rule that in the future beverages at all ball parks must be served only in paper containers.

Although officially listed as a joint promotion, the fight actually will be a Garden show. Besides attending to the stadium set-up, the Garden will sell the tickets, handle the publicity and be in entire charge of all promotion.

Except to share in the profits, if any, Mike Jacobs, head of the 20th Century club, will not be actively identified with the promotion save in an advisory capacity.
