

Reunion Held In Doty Grove

Pioneer Families Meet
On Donation Land
Claim Site

TALBOT, July 28.—The descendants of William and Elzira Looney and Nelson Ransome Doty and wife, Elzira Looney Doty, held their 28th annual reunion in the Doty grove northwest of Jefferson, near Talbot Sunday.

This was the donation land claim Doty's father, Nelson Ransome Doty, homesteaded in 1846. He came to Oregon in 1844 taking active part in the Cayuse Indian war.

Long Trek
Mr. and Mrs. William Looney and five children started from Springfield, Mo., in the spring of 1849, going to Sacramento. From there to Portland by ox team to the vicinity of Jefferson where they settled. Looney was drowned in the Santiam river after coming to Oregon, and his widow married Nelson Ransome Doty who was a shoemaker by trade and operated the first tannery in Marion county. W. E. Doty of Jefferson is the only survivor of the six Doty children.

The car crashed into a telegraph pole breaking it off. The pole fell over the car and is supposed to have caused the death of Mr. Ott. Upon examination by a doctor it was found that he suffered from heart failure.
