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LaNair Ruling Due Thursday

Early Decision Is Sought By Plaintiff as Many Convicts Affected

Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker, of Polk and Yamhill counties, yesterday heard arguments on a demurrer to the application of Roy LaNair for a writ of habeas corpus to secure his release from the state penitentiary. The application was made on the grounds that LaNair was entitled to allowance for good time in accordance with the practice which had been in vogue at the prison for 13 years.

Judge Walker stated that he would give a decision Thursday on the arguments presented yesterday. George Mowry, attorney for LaNair, urged haste in the consideration of the case, pointing out that the ruling will affect many men in the prison who are eligible for release should the writ be granted.

In his application for the writ, LaNair cited the ruling of the

Judge Refuses to Vacate Injunction

ASTORIA, Ore., July 28.—(P)—Judge Howard K. Zimmerman refused to vacate a preliminary injunction barring picketing of the Columbia River Packing association plants today.

The judge held there was no evidence that a labor dispute existed between the packers and members of the Pacific Coast Fisheries union, against which the injunction was issued. Pickets were picketed for a brief time last week when the packers purchased fish from members of the Depece Bay union, after the fisheries group and Columbia river packers failed to reach a price agreement.

Judge Zimmerman said if the defendants, by their associations, acquire the right to picket because the company refused them exclusive right to sell their fish to company plants, then any group of farmers could picket a merchant for buying from a farmer outside of those organized.

He held that trollers, operating their own boats and selling when and where they pleased, could not be designated as employees and that companies buying their product could not be called employers.

To Carry Letter On Skyline Trip

Two Salem Y.M.C.A. representatives next month will participate in a ridge route relay hike from the Mexican to the Canadian borders on which a letter of good will from Mexican officials is being carried to Canadian government leaders.

C. A. Kells, Y secretary, announced yesterday. Don Coons and Robert Brownell have been tentatively selected to carry the letter over the 50-mile lap assigned to Salem, the Skyline train from McKenzie pass to Wapinitia cutoff.

The Salem youths will be accompanied by Warren L. Rogers, guide and lecturer, of Alhambra, Calif., who is the only person making the entire hike along the mountain trails from Mexico to Canada. They are expected to start the Skyline lap about August 25.

Propose Railroad To Crescent City

GRANTS PASS, Ore., July 28.—(P)—Proposals to establish a railroad from Grants Pass to Crescent City took definite form today with the dispatching to Washington of an application for \$7,380,523 on a WPA grant and RFC loan for a transportation, relief and resettlement project for 10,000 families from the drought-stricken midwest.

The families would be settled along the right of way. The application was made by the city for the Oregon portion of the proposed line, and by the Crescent City harbor district for the California portion. The project would be known as the Mid-Pacific railroad.

The plan was said to have the approval of the regional and district WPA administrators in the two states involved.

The completed project, in addition to the railroad, is envisioned as entailing an expenditure of \$5,000,000 for resettlement and irrigation, \$4,500,000 for completion of the Crescent City harbor and \$2,400,000 for feeder rail lines.
