

Cake, Ice Cream Always Popular

As Party Refreshment at
Any Season; Sundae
Recipe Offered

Frills may come and go, but it is still hard to beat ice cream and cake as a party refreshment. The cake may be fairly simple especially if the ice cream is disguised as a sundae. Buy plain angel foods and frost them to suit yourself if you don't like to bake.

Sundae Sauce
2 squares chocolate
1 cup cold water
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 tablespoons butter
1 teaspoonful vanilla
1/2 cup white karo
1 teaspoon mint essence
Cut chocolate into 5 or 6 pieces and stir over direct heat with water until smooth and thick. Add sugar, karo and pinch of salt and stir until dissolved. Boil 2 minutes, add butter, vanilla and mint flavoring and serve on ice cream.

Date Ice Cream
1 cup milk, scalded
1/2 cup sugar
2 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons lemon juice
2 eggs
1 pkg. pasteurized dates
1 cup orange juice
1 qt. thin cream
Mix flour, sugar and salt; add scalded milk, gradually, stirring until smooth paste is formed. Cook over low water until mixture thickens, stirring constantly. Pour mixture over slightly beaten eggs; cook over hot water for one minute. Strain; add finely cut dates, and cream and cook. Add strained fruit juice and freeze. Serves 12.

Sombrero
2 1/2 cups cooked rice
6 slices pineapple
1/2 cup fruit juice
1/2 cup fresh mint, chopped
Whipped cream
Mayonnaise
Lettuce
Green pepper strips
Marinate rice with fruit juice to which has been added the chopped mint. Mold rice into cones about 2 inches in diameter. Place a cone on each slice of pineapple and arrange a strip of green pepper around base to represent a hat band. Serve on crisp lettuce with whipped cream mayonnaise.

Onion Crop Is Damaged About Two-Thirds Says Official at Walla Walla

WALLA WALLA, July 29.—(AP)—District Horticulturist Ray Kelso today said Walla Walla valley growers will be lucky if they harvest one-third their normal onion crop this year, with 65 per cent of the crop being damaged beyond salvage.

The late freeze and increased wireworm activity were blamed for the decreased yield. The harvest will not exceed 250 carloads, compared with the normal 750, Kelso said.

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One Hot Meal Daily Is Advised Even For Hot Weather; Corn Is Abundant, Methods of Serving Prove Numerous

It is a temptation during warm weather to forget about the stove and serve only cold food. This can be overcome, however, and hot food of some sort should be served at least once a day.

Fresh corn is abundant now and aside from the traditional corn on the cob method of eating, try some of the following ideas sent in by Salem housewives:

Corn-Tomato Toast
1 tablespoon butter
2 cups grated cheese
1/2 cups canned or grated corn
from the cob
1 ripe pimiento
1/2 cup tomato puree
2 egg yolks
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1 clove of garlic
4 slices of bread
Into the melted butter stir the cheese until it, too, is melted. Then add the corn and pimiento, stir for a moment; then add egg yolks beaten and mixed with the tomato sauce, salt and paprika. Have ready the bread toasted on one side and very lightly rubbed on its toasted side with the garlic cut in two. Stir the mixture until the eggs are cooked and pour over the untoasted side of the bread. Serve at once.

Corn Fritters With Chicken
1 cup flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
3/4 teaspoon sugar
1 cup cooked corn, cut from cob, or
1 cup canned corn, well drained
1 egg
1/4 cup milk
Sift dry ingredients together. Mix in corn. Add beaten egg and

drop by large spoonfuls onto hot greased griddle or heavy skillet and bake, browning on both sides. Arrange on hot serving platter and pour creamed chicken over each fritter. If chicken gravy is used, make fritters slightly larger and thinner and place three for a serving. Pour gravy over all. This recipe serves 4-6.
