

# Owens Breaks World 200-Meter Record; Americans Far Ahead

## Third Victory Won by Negro

Trojan Vaulter Also Sets Olympic Mark; Points Total Over 100

BERLIN, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Incomparable Jesse Owens, whose blazing bursts of speed and jumping ability have thrilled nearly half a million spectators on four successive days, completed his classic Olympic triple title conquest today in record-smashing style in a rain.

Approximately 75,000 spectators, the smallest crowd yet occupying the huge stadium any afternoon, made up in cheers what it lacked in numbers as the dynamic American negro added the 200-meter title to his previous triumphs in the 100-meter sprint and the broad jump.

Pursued by his dusky Pasadena, Calif., teammate, Matthew "Mack" Robinson, who finished second, the Ohio state all-round star ended an unbeaten campaign by lowering the world as well as the Olympic mark around one turn to 20.7 seconds.

Owens, in contributing the fifth American negro triumph in these games, featured another big day in which the United States team soared well over the 100 mark in the team point standings, leaving all rivals far behind.

In addition to the 200-meter final, Americans finished one-two in the discus throw with Ken Carpenter of Compton, Calif., beating his California rival, Gordon "Slingshot" Dan by hurling the plating 50.48 meters, 185 feet 7 3/4 inches, for a new Olympic record.

Vault Record Set  
Another gold medal was added to the steadily growing American collection by Earl Meadows of Fort Worth, Tex. The southern Californian Trojan vaulter soared to the Olympic mark-smashing height of 4.35 meters, 14 feet 2 1/2 inches, eclipsing the old record of 14 feet 1 7/8 inches made by Bill Miller at Los Angeles four years ago.

The day's competition saw Great Britain retain the 50-kilo-meter walk championship as Harold Whitlock clipped nearly 30 minutes from the record, winning in four hours 39 minutes 41.4 seconds.

Reichstuehrer Adolf Hitler was driven from his official box by a heavy downpour of rain just after Owens flashed across the finish line for his third triumph.

Owens became the fourth American to capture three or more championships in one Olympic and the first athlete to achieve a triple since peerless Paavo Nurmi ran them all dizzy in 1924 at Paris.

The negro joined the company of Arthur Kraenzlein, who won four events in 1906, Ray Ewry, who swept three standing jumps twice in 1906 and 1904, and Archie Hahn, triple sprint winner in 1904.

## Jarrett May Sue Olympic Leaders

BERLIN, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Arthur Jarrett announced late tonight his intention of taking legal action against the American Olympic committee upon returning to New York with his wife, Eleanor Holm Jarrett, who was dismissed from the Olympic team on its arrival in Germany.

After being refused a conference by Avery Brundage, president of the American Olympic committee, Jarrett in a statement asserted he would take "the proper steps, first to obtain the truth about the case, which the American Olympic committee apparently tried to conceal, and secondly to get redress for damages to my wife's reputation."

Jarrett and Brundage failed to get together for a conference, despite the former's efforts during the past two days. They conferred lengthily by telephone, however, apparently getting nowhere.

## WPA Labor Offer Is Made to Court

For Santiam Road Project But Members Doubtful of Accepting Plan

An offer of WPA labor for construction work on four miles of the North Santiam highway between Gates and Niagara was made to the county court yesterday by James E. Smith, WPA district director, and W. M. Bartlett, engineer. The proposal calls for the use of state highway plans for the road and the furnishing of equipment for the work by the county.

Should the offer of the WPA officials be accepted, the men working on the road would be housed at the Santiam camp, formerly used as a transient camp. Smith said he would like to see the work started within a month.

Officials Doubtful  
County officials were doubtful if the program could be completed. They pointed out that county funds for the balance of the year were budgeted and that the county had only enough to care for regular needs.

Ray Melson, county commissioner, pointed out that the county was already cooperating on the WPA project on the Champoog road and had spent \$15000 for right-of-way on that construction.

LeRoy Hewlett, commissioner, said that he believed that it was up to the state to supervise and handle the construction as the road had been taken over as a secondary highway by the state.

"I believe all we can do is to donate the use of the Santiam camp," Hewlett said.

Both Commissioner Hewlett and Judge Selmsdorf were out of the city on county business when the WPA officials called on the court yesterday morning.

Blanket Project Declared Possible  
Smith urged that the county court accept the WPA offer and stated that the project could be put in as a blanket road project. He said that the county could buy a bulldozer and pay for it out of next year's budget. Both Smith and Bartlett said they would call on R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, with reference to the state sponsoring the work.

The 12-mile stretch of road above Mill City is one of the worst sections of the North Santiam highway. With the completion of grading of the pass which is being done by the federal government it is feared that heavy traffic from eastern Oregon will make the road extremely dangerous.

The WPA offer for a free labor would cover the worst four miles of the road. Cost of the work is estimated at \$250,000.
