Counter-Offer Is Made For Timber

After investigating a proposed trade of timber land along the North Santiam highway, County Judge Siegmund and County Engineer Hubbs yesterday refused the offer made by a Portland man and offered instead to trade land where timber had already been cut, but insisted that no further cutting should be done on the right-of-way.

The proposal to trade the land came after loggers had started cutting timber which was supposed to be owned by the Portland man, but belonged to the county. About 50,000 feet of logs were cut. The trade would have been for land along the highway privately owned, and river land, owned by the county.
