Pardon Revoked — Governor Martin Friday revoked the conditional pardon granted to Willis John Klink of Clatsop county December 23, 1935. Klink originally was released at the penitentiary here June 7, 1933, to serve five years for larceny. Officials said Klink recently violated the provisions of the pardon and would be returned to the penitentiary. He was involved in the timber workers' riots in Clatsop county but was not tried on this charge, officials said.

Two Suits For Divorce Begun

Desertion, Cruelty Claims Made; Sheriff Answers Eiker's Complaint

Two complaints for divorce were filed in circuit court yesterday. Alice Gower asks separation from Veri Gower and Lorena Savage is seeking a divorce from Delbert Savage.

The Gowers were married in Salem February 27, 1926. The plaintiff charges the defendant with desertion and asks \$15 a month support money for one minor child.

The Savage complaint charges desertion and inhuman treatment. Reasonable support money for two minor children is requested. They were married June 22, 1923. There are no property rights involved in either suit.

Sheriff A. C. Burk yesterday filed answer to the complaint of P. A. Eiker which asked damages against the sheriff of \$100 for the alleged wrongful holding of a \$300 car.

In his answer Sheriff Burk states that the car was taken under a writ of attachment from the Salem justice court in the case of the Merchants Credit Bureau, Inc., against Mr. and Mrs. Paul Shearer. He admits that the plaintiff has some right to the car but asks that execution issue and that funds received from sale of the property be applied to satisfaction of the justice court judgment and then be applied to the interest of Eiker.

Fort Rock Lands Purchase Sought

Conservation Area Urged by Governor; Critical Situation Is Cited

Purchase by the federal government of 402,421 acres of privately owned lands in the proposed Fort Rock conservation area in Lake county, was urged by Governor Martin in a letter sent Friday to Rexford G. Tugwell, administrator of the federal resettlement administration.

Governor Martin said this action on the part of the government would aid residents there in their "grim battle of attrition with the inexorable forces of nature."

The governor urged that the proposed area be set up as part of the program of the resettlement administration, since the "situation in the Fort Rock area has been critical for many years."

A special allotment of federal funds would be necessary, Governor Martin said.

Million Acres There — The area involved includes more than a million acres of land, but the bulk of it is reserved or unreserved public domain and national forests.

Governor Martin pointed out that private lands spotted a region of overwhelming government ownership and that the residents there could not continue existence without financial assistance.

Officials said this was the initial step toward establishing a conservation area in this state. The transaction was said to be legal under the federal resettlement act.
