MT. ANGEL, Aug. 7.—September 3, 4, 5 are the dates set for the first flax festival ever held in Oregon. Mt. Angel, which has one of the state's three retting and scutching plants, is under-taking the festival to honor this promising industry of the Willamette valley. The Mt. Angel Business Men's club has outlined a full program of events to insure a successful festival.

Governor Martin, Senator Charles McNary, E. J. Griffith, WPA administrator, and other state and federal officials are expected to be present. Preliminary highlights of the festival are now underway as candidates are competing for the honor to reign as queen. Voting tickets are given with each ten cent purchase at local stores.

Queen's Ball
Thursday night, August 20, the queen candidates' ball will be given at St. Mary's auditorium. All the candidates will receive special recognition.

The actual festivities will begin on Thursday evening, September 3, at Ebner park with a softball game between the Mt. Angel all stars and the team winning the state tournament, which will have been played by that time.

Following the softball game will be the coronation dance at the Mt. Angel flax plant just north of Mt. Angel. The queen and her court will be crowned with appropriate ceremonies.

Friday evening a donkey baseball game will be featured at the Ebner park to be followed by a dance.

Saturday's Events
On Saturday, September 5, the entire dedication ceremonies will take place, opening with a parade and addresses. Festivities will be continued throughout the day with sports, an evening band concert and chorus singing, wrestling match and closing with a dance at the flax plant.

The surrounding communities have promised to take part in Mt. Angel's celebration, particularly since Eugene-Springfield and Canby Molalla are sites of the other two flax projects.
