Flames Raging in 7 States, Canada

Prospects of cool weather brought some hope to weary foresters, but \$500 CCC and WPA workers were mobilized, ready to join the flame fight on a moment's notice. Red Cross aid was rushed to stricken residents of the harassed region.

Six hundred men battled a flame which spread from a peat bog to engulf 1,500 acres of second grade timber along the Canadian boundary of Idaho.

Wisconsin officials estimated 150 separate fires were burning in that state. Fear was expressed for the safety of 20 passengers aboard the motorboat "Faith" which left Portage, Mich., Saturday night.

In Canada, southwestern Alberta was the scene of scores of timber and range land fires, at least six of them whipped to "major" proportions by strong winds. Fires burned in Washington state but apparently the fire fighters had checked the serious advance of the flames there.

Extended Class Struggle Looms in Spain



Back of the current civil war which has turned most of Spain into a bloody battleground is a story of class struggle and factional strife of deeper significance than any mere political upheaval. It is the climax of an extended social revolution between the government Leftists who seek radical reforms of socialistic nature and the Rightists who favor a monarchy and the old order. Principals in this contest for supremacy are General Franco, one of the revolutionary leaders, and President Azaña, whose policies as premier and president contributed to the outbreak. Little more than a spectator to the situation is Ex-King Alfonso who is unlikely to win back his throne despite the monarchial sympathies of many in the peninsula republic because of recent scandals in the royal family.

already has paid out \$4242.47, Gilmore reported. All but \$1069.86 of this amount went for expenses other than salaries. It included painting the pools, building a tennis court at Richmond school, adding to the bathhouses, installing lawn sprinkling systems and landscaping.

The trial activities at Richmond, Englewood and Highland schools will include story hours, sports supervision, and craftwork. Qualified directors, if they can be found on the WPA employment lists, will be stationed at each school three hours a day, three or four days a week, Gilmore plans.

All members of the present playground staff who are paid out of city funds, with the exception of Isabel Morehouse and Esther Black, will be replaced with WPA workers under the federal recreation project plan. Fifteen such workers, of whom all but two must be eligible for relief, will be made available, according to Robert J. Manasse, state director of emergency recreation projects.

May Continue to January, Indicated

Due to the lateness of the project's start, the recreation program may be continued until January 1, Manasse said. Play directors may be stationed at the school grounds after class hours, while others may conduct night gymnasium, art and craft classes for adults.

Salem, Albany, Corvallis and Oregon City will be the first Oregon communities to benefit under the new project, Manasse reported.

He predicted, however, that the program would build up to its standing last year, when 25 towns and cities were receiving aid in recreation activities.

The city of San Sebastian faced an acute food shortage. Inhabitants lined up in the seaside resort for rations of bread and water.

The Guadarrama mountains in chain, where Sunday 800 rebels were reported killed in a nine-hour battle, appeared quiet.
