

Fire Destroys Straw, Threatens Grain on Farm at Keizer

Conflagration Halts Baling

Straw Falls on Tractor to Start Blaze on Hall Farm

KEIZER, Aug. 12.—What might have been a disastrous fire occurred a little after noon today on the E. T. Hall place.

The baler was there baling straw, when a bunch of the straw fell on the tractor and caught fire, setting fire to the stack. The machinery, belonging to Henry Wachon, was saved but 27 bales of straw, besides the loose straw, were lost.

Men worked to save the fire from spreading in the dry stubble by plowing a furrow around the fire.

The straw had been purchased from Mr. Hall by W. E. Savage.

M., Elceta Chapter No. 29, Order of Eastern Star and Yeoman of Dayton.

Mr. Hole was married April 15, 1903, at New Haven, Ohio, to Miss Cora Snyder. Four children were born, the first, a daughter, died in infancy. Surviving children are his widow, two sons, Leland and Edgar, and one daughter, Mrs. George Webster, all of Dayton; one brother, Charles Hole of Plymouth, Ohio; one sister, Mrs. Ari Duffey, of Mansfield, Ohio.

Funeral services were held at the Mason lodge. Burial was in the Evergreen Memorial Park cemetery in McMinnville.

New Water Mains Will Be Placed

Excavation Work Started at Scio For Pipe Line Additions

SCIO, Aug. 12.—Excavation is under way for laying of 600 feet of 6-inch castiron water mains to replace worn 3-inch steel mains along three blocks of Mill street from the corner of Main to the corner of Wheeler in Scio.

The new pipes will be laid about two feet beneath the surface, a few inches deeper than the old, smaller pipes.

The larger mains will increase and improve water supply at the Scio school building, located on the corner of Mill and Wheeler streets. Additional pipe will probably be laid from the school house to the gymnasium to provide for showers in the latter, if such improvement is voted by the school board.
