Guilty Is Plea In Four Cases

Webster, Bearn, Gigger Get Prison Sentences In Circuit Court

Four men waived grand jury investigation and pleaded guilty to the crimes charged against them in circuit court yesterday. Judge L. H. McMahan received the pleas and gave penitentiary sentences in three of the cases.

John Webster received a four months penitentiary sentence on a charge of larceny of an automobile. Webster was returned from Roseburg last week after giving himself up there following theft of a car here belonging to Weldon W. Albright.

Frank Bearn was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary for the possession of an automatic pistol having been convicted of a felony. This is the fourth conviction for Bearn. He was arrested originally on a larceny charge which was later changed to the pistol carrying violation when sufficient evidence could not be obtained to sustain the original complaint.

Joseph Gigger, on a charge of larceny in a dwelling, was confined to the penitentiary for one month. He was accused of taking property belonging to G. G. Scholl of Woodburn.

W. C. Foster was given credit for time already served on a two year sentence. He was charged with indecent and immoral conduct.

—Circuit Court— Eunice Stam, administrator of the estate of Pearl O. Fuller, vs. the defendant, evidence submitted by defendants Bush and Sparks filed. They declare that the death of Mrs. Fuller was caused by her carelessness and negligence in walking on the paved highway when struck by a car driven by Fuller.

Fred A. Wells vs. W. D. Collins; stipulation to try case without a jury upon a stipulated statement of facts, arguments to be submitted by brief of attorneys. Nadine T. Hall vs. James J. Hall; motion for contempt order by Mrs. May Layton on grounds that defendant has failed to pay \$50 support money as ordered by the court on July 25.

Mas Parsons vs. Delbert Parsons; complaint for divorce on grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married August 5, 1931. She asks custody of one minor child, reasonable support money, and \$75 attorney fees. Order was also signed restraining the defendant from molesting the plaintiff during the suit, custody of the child was given to the mother while the action is being tried.

Maudie Sayles Goodier vs. J. H. Goodier; complaint for divorce on grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. The couple was married at North Bend, March 28, 1931. There are no children or property rights involved in the suit. She charges that the defendant failed to provide her with the necessities of life, that he was suspicious and would destroy her mail and that he had called her "cheap."

Rotary Hears of Hamilton Meeting Vision Problems Draws Group Here

Realization that effective vision is not proven by ability to read a row of letters of a given size at a designated distance is essential to educators and others interested in the welfare of school children, it was emphasized by Dr. L. R. Burdette, Salem optometrist, in an address at the Rotary club luncheon Wednesday.

Effective vision means in addition to seeing, the transfer of the proper impulse to the word recognition center of the brain and to the memory center and this does not occur in cases of eye fatigue, Dr. Burdette explained. Thus investigation beyond mere ability to see, should be made in the case of each retarded school pupil.

"Progressive myopia" or nearsightedness is becoming a general condition because of the relatively sudden transition in the use of vision, from far-away objects to closely-scanned printed words, Dr. Burdette declared. He stressed the need of proper school lighting.

The local optometrist, introduced as vice president of the national association, mentioned that he was enabled to obtain this office through self-sacrificing withdrawal of Dr. A. W. Glutich who otherwise would have been re-elected a national trustee at the recent Detroit convention.

Project to Move School Approved

District WPA officials here yesterday applied for permission to start two projects which have received approval at Washington, D. C. They have asked that a pre-school building be undertaken on the Fern Ridge school building and grading the grounds be started August 16. This project, costing the WPA \$1,254 and the school district \$228, would keep eight men at work for three months, it is estimated.

The other project is an extension of the Woodburn-Hubbard drainage works which WPA engineers feel should be undertaken during the low water season. Forty men would receive \$6,840 from the WPA as wages over a three-month period while the drainage district would pay \$613 for equipment and construction materials.

Seek Removal of Excavated Gravel

The farmers in the Ainsville district who have so far declined to give the Salem water department easements for the gravity pipeline right-of-way want assurance that rock and gravel from trench excavations will not be left on top of the ground to damage farm operations, according to H. C. Porter, leader of the group. He yesterday declared there was no disposition among the farmers to delay the project.

Were the gravel and rock not removed, harrows and other implements would scatter the material and make the land unmarketable, Porter contended.

Oregon Marksmen To Enter Contest

National Guard, Civilian Teams Will Depart For Camp Perry Soon

Expert rifle marksmen of Oregon, both military and civilian, will leave next week for Camp Perry, Ohio, where they will compete with some of the best marksmen in the United States. Major General White, commanding the Oregon National Guard, announced Wednesday.

The contest to determine the championship in the use of rifle and pistol is an annual event held under the direction of the war department through the national board for the promotion of rifle practice. Ranges from 200 to 1000 yards are fired and trophies and medals are awarded the winning individuals and teams. Matches will be held from September 3 to 12.

Oregon's National Guard team is composed of Langdon H. Spooner, Portland, team captain; Carl V. Shoemaker, Portland, team coach, and 13 shooting members. They are Leland A. Peterson, LaGrande; George Johnson and Oamound W. Olson, Silverton; Frank M. Sprouse, Forest Grove; and Murray S. Starr, St. Helens. Sprouse and Starr are alternates.

Harry Fraser of Molalla will captain the civilian team, composed of Ernest Barrien, Milwaukie; Emil D. Ritter, William A. Johnson and Ralph W. Kaufman, Portland; James H. Wolford, Roseburg; James E. Bostic, Thomas W. Buxton, Robert E. Burleigh and Fred N. Purley, Bend; Hugh P. Pearson, Winchester; Gairie M. Upehau and Paul C. Upehau, Yoncalla.

Blackberries Are Reaching Cannery

Ending a three weeks lay-off between seasons, Salem canneries are beginning to resume work as deliveries of evergreen blackberries are starting. Picking of the berries will not be in full swing for another week but substantial deliveries are now being made. The season will run until September 15.

Tomato packing will start at the Starr Fruit products cannery next week. The Starr company is the only plant packing tomatoes this year. Glen Lengren, manager, said the pack would be larger than last year but was unable to give an estimate of the total pack. In West Salem, the Hillman packing company has been canning West Station beans and is starting to receive blackberries.

The blackberries now coming in are practically all from cultivated fields. The wild berries are not expected to enter the market to any large extent this year.
