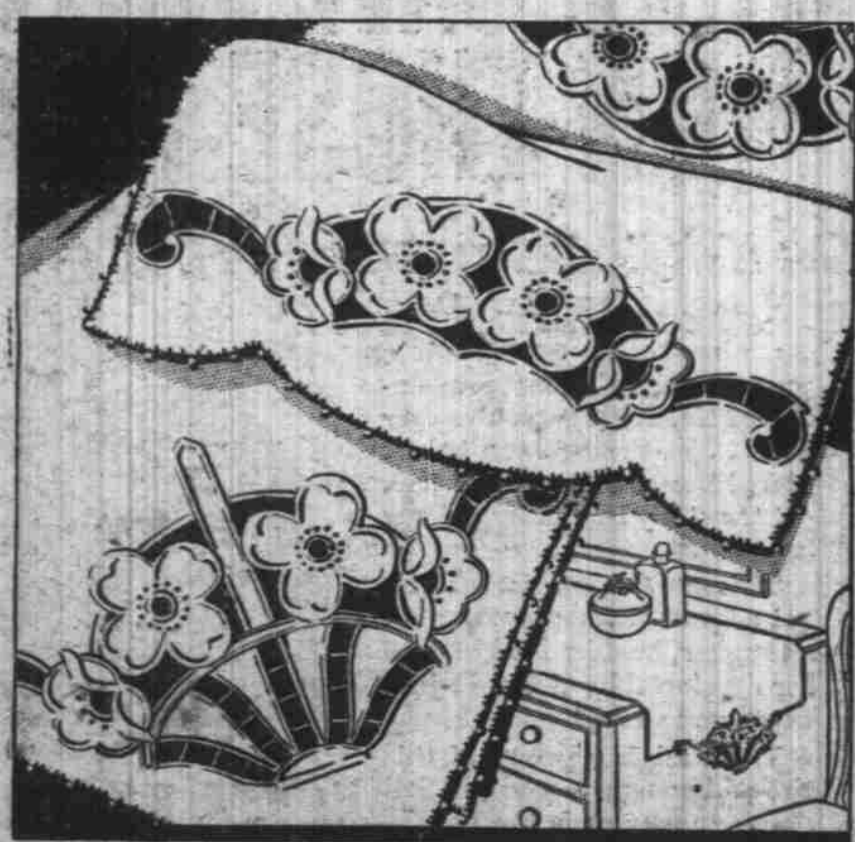

Stricklin Figures Irrigation Costs

It would cost the state of Oregon approximately \$13,200 for irrigation works of sufficient capacity to water the farms operated by the Oregon state hospital, western Oregon tuberculosis hospital and penitentiary annex, C. E. Stricklin, state engineer, reported Wednesday to State Treasurer Holman.

The cost of materials for the project would aggregate \$4,100, Stricklin said. He suggested that an appropriation of \$16,000 be provided for the work.

Stricklin recommended that a water be obtained from the Salem ditch which is owned jointly by the municipality and a number of industrial concerns.

The proposal to irrigate all prison farms is now before the state board of control.

Wood Survey For Capitol Arranged

Rare, Historical as Well as Typical Varieties of Oregon Sought

With the desire that the new Oregon capitol building contain fine examples of representative, rare and historically interesting woods, of this state, the Willamette Valley and West Coast Lumbermen's associations are conducting a survey to find data on such woods and specimens of the varieties. Information and examples which they gather will be made available to the capitol commission and the architects as they plan to use the woods in meaningful as well as artistic manner.

The associations have sent out questionnaires seeking information on woods of the state and the names of authorities of wood and wood finishing in various parts of the state. They are dividing the Oregon woods into four classes, the "commercial woods", major hardwoods and rare woods.

The forestry department of Oregon State college, and other agencies are offering assistance in the survey. It is hoped that a clearing house for such information may be developed which will be of use to architects, designers and others in the future. Copies of the survey questionnaire may be secured from the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, Guard Building, Eugene, and copies should be sent to the Gey Gypsy Craftsmen, Eugene.
