

3,000 People Present at 4-L Picnic at Hazel Green Park

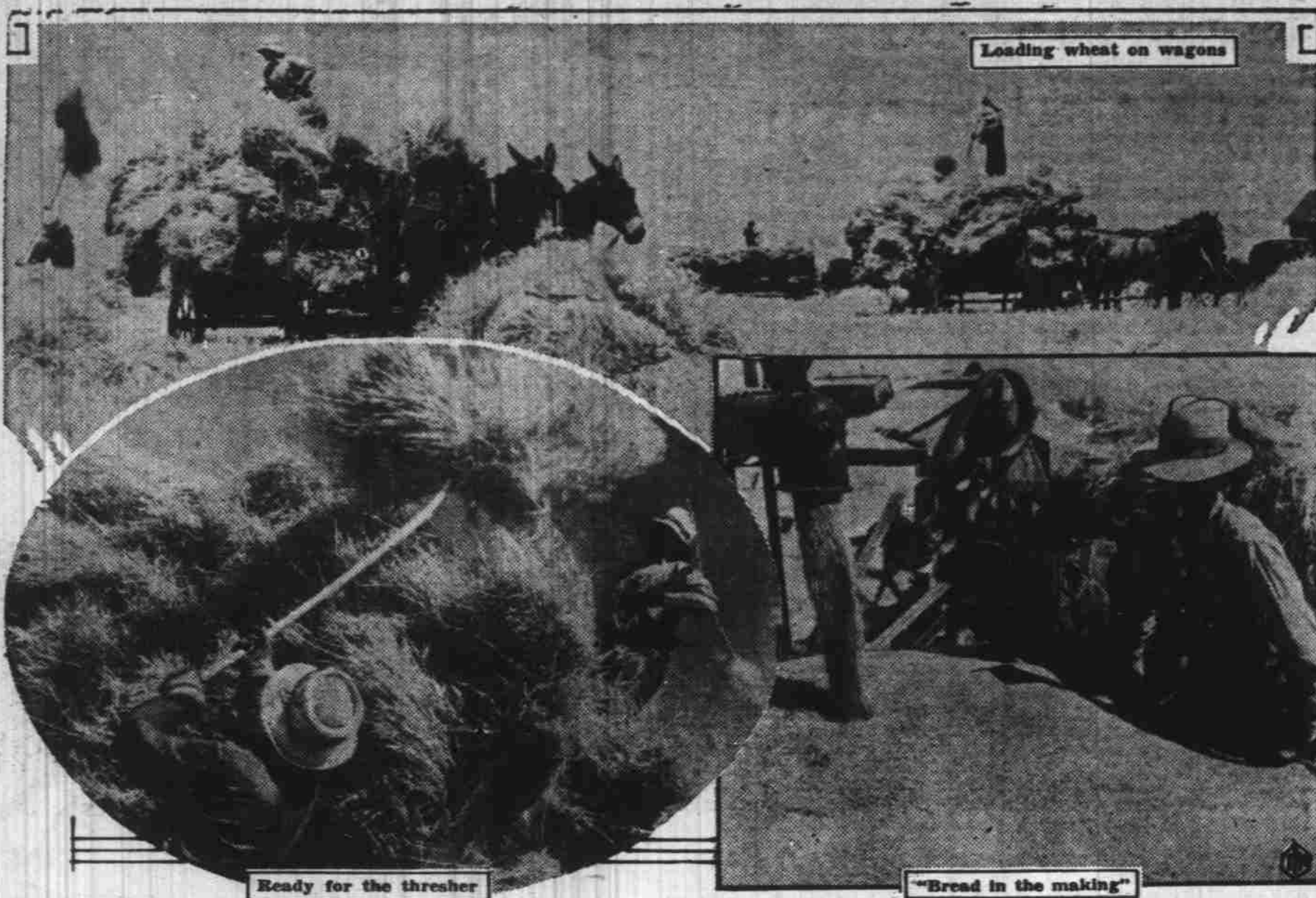
There were approximately 300 people at the picnic. Picnic dinner at 1 o'clock was followed by watermelon which was provided by the county organization.

Work Is Begun on \$25,000 Project

INDEPENDENCE, Aug. 17.—The \$25,000 construction job across the fill leading to the north city limits of Independence has been started by the United Contracting company of Portland, who have the contract.

The project provides for widening, grading and resurfacing the fill which starts at Main street and proceeds to the north city limits.

The United Contracting company have contracted with E. Williams for 10,000 to 12,000 yards of gravel from his pit, for widening the fill just north of the little bridge across Ash creek. About 600 yards daily will be delivered.

This improvement is expected to eliminate the bottle-neck condition that has existed for nearly 2
