

Louis Pounds Jack Sharkey Into Oblivion in Three Rounds

Bomber Shows Doubting Fans

Ex-Champ Gets No Chance to Test Out Negro's Vulnerable Spot

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—(AP)—The Braddocks and the Schmeling can look to their laurels. Joe Louis, the Detroit man killer, is on the warpath again.

In the Yankee stadium tonight the negro boy showed a crowd of less than 20,000 fans the Louis of the Primo Carnera and Max Baer fights in knocking out Jack Sharkey of Boston in the third round of their ten round bout.

It was the most crushing defeat in the history of the sport. Louis flattened him three times for a count of nine before firing two devastating lefts to the head that sent the former champion reeling to the canvas again, this time out for keeps, a minute and two seconds after the round started.

Back in Limestone
The victory once again projected Louis, hailed as a super fighter—until his stunning defeat by Max Schmeling in June, back into the flinty spotlight. He ranked him as the No. 1 contender for a shot at the winner of the forthcoming James J. Braddock-Max Schmeling title engagement.

For Sharkey, who likewise had dreamed of another championship match, it probably meant little or nothing. Until he was told the name of negro dynamite tonight, old Jack had been in the midst of a comeback campaign of his own.

Not in all his long ring campaigning has Sharkey seen so many right and left hand punches. They aimed all over him from all directions.

Louis swarmed out with the first bell like a sleek, brown panther. He eluded Sharkey with rights to the head and lefts to the head and body. Twice he drove the puzzled tar into the ropes. Somehow old Jack won the round by a pinning assault and finished the round on his feet.

Not Started Yet
To many in the crowd it looked like Jack had taken the best Louis had in shop. But the slaughter didn't really get started until the second.

Before the round was well under way, Louis belted Sharkey with a pulverizing right that opened a recent cut over the former gobb's left eye. A few seconds later another pile driving right to the jaw sent Jack down for the first knockdown.

The crowd stood and howled as Sharkey, a bewildered expression on his face, pulled himself to his feet with the aid of the ropes as the time-keeper called "nine."

Before Jack could more than raise his gloves the negro tore in with a series of rights and lefts. First he'd fire a right to the head and a left to the body. Then a left to the head and a right to the body. Sharkey hit the resin for another count of nine.

Had this round gone a few seconds longer Jack likely would have been counted out. He staggered to his feet after the second knockdown and was holding on at the bell.

Louis, as fresh as when he started and showing all the savage fire that marked his work prior to the Schmeling rout, lost no time putting on the finishing touches in the third.

Downed Four Times
Sharkey, his mouth and eye bleeding, ran squarely into a short right flush to the jaw and hit the boards for the third knockdown, again for the count of nine.

Dazed, bruised and aching all over, he gallantly climbed back to his feet, just in time to be caught with two sizzling lefts and a short right to the head. Down he went to stay.

The crowd gave Jack a rousing hand as he regained his feet just after the time-keeper reached the count of ten.

Sharkey landed only one real blow. Early in the second, he fired a long left that caught Louis on the face. The blow carried plenty of steam and jarred the negro momentarily.

Louis never gave Sharkey a chance to belt him with his right as Jack had predicted he would do. Whether he still is as easy to hit with a good right was not established tonight because he never once gave Sharkey an opportunity to open up with this weapon, the blow that sent the negro to defeat at the hands of Schmeling. The official attendance was announced as 23,331, and the gross receipts \$159,982. The net receipts were \$136,345.

Fight by Rounds

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Joe Louis, Detroit's heavyweight hope, started back along the comeback trail tonight in a 10-round bout with Jack Sharkey, Boston veteran, before 35,000 fans in the Yankee stadium.

The weights were 199½ for Louis and 197½ for Sharkey. Arthur Donovan was announced as the referee and judges were Charlie Lynch and Eddie Forbes.

ROUND ONE
Donovan called them to the center of the ring. Louis perched a couple of lefts, then missed a right swing to the head as they went into a clinch. Louis caught Sharkey with two hard rights and drove him to the ropes with two lefts and a series of right uppercuts. Sharkey jabbed but missed a right as they went into a clinch. Louis caught Sharkey on the ropes with another right and then missed a left as Sharkey held. Joe jabbed with his left and caught Sharkey's right on his gloves. The former champion landed several high rights from in close and then danced away keeping his left in the negro's face. Louis landed a hard right to the body. Louis' round.

ROUND TWO
They came out boxing with Sharkey keeping his left in Louis' face. Louis missed a left and then caught the former champion with a right and left to the head but received a hard left to the face in return. Louis swung to Sharkey's face with a hard left and opened the cut over Sharkey's eye. He battered the Bostonian with rights and lefts to the head and sent him down with a hard right for a count of nine. Louis landed a right and left to Sharkey's body, flooring him for a count of nine again. Louis tore in again with lefts and rights as Sharkey hung on desperately. Another left sent Jack reeling but he came back and held on at the bell. Louis' round.

ROUND THREE
Louis sparred carefully but Jack came in with a left that forced the negro to give ground. Louis sent Sharkey down with two lefts for a count of nine. Sharkey was apparently out on his feet as Louis sent him to the mat with two hard lefts for the final count.

Experts Disagree On Braddock Hand

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Solely a battery of physicians peered at Jimmy Braddock's ailing left hand today, then offered such contradictory testimony as to whether the injury was serious enough to warrant postponement of the heavyweight champion's 15-round title defense against Max Schmeling next month that the New York state athletic commission ordered Jimmy to consult a "prominent bone specialist" and report the outcome next Tuesday.

Indications tonight were that the bout would not be held in September. Jimmy Johnston, boxing director of Madison Square Garden, said the fight would be held next May in the event a postponement became necessary.

Joe Gould, Braddock's little manager, insisted he didn't care what the commission decided on Tuesday. As far as he is concerned Braddock will not fight again this year.

"I can't let Jim fight with a bad hand," Gould said. "At least five doctors advised us that it would be unwise for him to do any boxing for at least three months. I don't care what the commission rules. The fight is off as far as we are concerned."

From now on through the state tournament fans won't have to walk through ankle deep dust to get into the stand, according to Harold. Also he has given the inside of the grandstand a thorough cleansing and says there is not much danger of even the whitest dresses becoming soiled.
