Seiners File Argument—The Columbia River Seiners union, comprised of 800 members, filed in the state department Tuesday an argument opposing an initiative measure prohibiting the use of certain gears, traps and other set fishing devices in the Columbia river and tributaries. The measure will be printed in the measures pamphlet prior to the November election. The time for filing negative arguments involving initiative measures and constitutional amendments at the November election expires at 5 p. m. today.

Six Traffic Deaths—There were six motor vehicle fatalities in Oregon during the period August 4 to 17. Secretary of State Snell reported Tuesday. Accidents numbered 1064 with 221 persons injured. Counties reporting one fatality each were Lane, Clackamas, Lincoln, Klamath, Marion and Multnomah. There were 332 accidents reported in Multnomah county, with Washington county second with 21 accidents.

Dr. Barlick had received no further word from a brother-in-law of Healy, who had wired that he was coming to Salem from Los Angeles to claim the body.

To Build Garages—Two of the four permits issued by the city building department yesterday were to erect private garages. Unavoidable Accident—William Kellogg reported to Sheriff Burk yesterday what he termed an "unavoidable accident" on bridge near Turner. A Kansas car was involved in the collision. Both drivers agreed to pay for their own damage. Kellogg said he came around a curve onto the bridge to face the oncoming car and several children. The drivers applied their brakes but collided to avoid hitting the children.

Urges Speed Canby—Governor Martin was in Portland Tuesday conferring with E. J. Griffith, works progress administrator, relative to completion and operation of the new flax plant at Canby. Governor Martin said he was anxious to get the retting tanks completed because of the danger of rains within the next few weeks.

Statistics Filed—The statistical report on motor vehicle convictions for July was filed with U. G. Boyer, county clerk, yesterday. The report shows one case handled in circuit court, 30 in justice court, 20 in municipal court, five in Silverton justice court, six in Silverton municipal court and 50 in Woodburn justice court. Three drivers' licenses were suspended and five revoked in the county during the period.

Budget Deadline Set—The state budget department today directed all state department heads and institution superintendents to submit their tentative budgets for the 1937-38 biennium by September 1. All budgets must receive approval of Governor Martin before being printed and filed with the legislature. Governor Martin said he would insist all budgets be held to the minimum.

Demurrer Argued—Arguments on a demurrer attacking the jurisdiction of the court in the case of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Hewlett vs. Floyd Slegmund were heard by Judge L. G. Lewelling yesterday. The Hewletts are seeking custody of their grandchild, the son of Floyd Slegmund and their deceased daughter. The child is now in the care of the father.

To Improve Roads—Improvement of roads around Chemawa is being contemplated by authorities at the Indian school. County Engineer Hubbs was there yesterday studying the situation. Some of the roads around the school may be oiled. Such a program would be handled by WPA labor but there is a possibility that the county oiling equipment may be used.

Campbell Recuperating—Chief Justice Campbell of the state supreme court left Tuesday for a beach resort near Oceanlake, where he will recuperate from a recent eye operation. Upon his return from the coast he will submit to another operation.

Passes Prelim—Wayne Morris, Aumsville, passed a preliminary examination for enlistment in the 10th field artillery at Fort Lewis, Wash., yesterday and was sent to Vancouver Barracks for final examination.
