Hop Fiesta Queen Choice Next Week

Opal Burch of Salem Leads 13 Entries in Queen Race

Only next Wednesday the queen of the third annual Hop Fiesta will be selected, and the announcement of the winner will be made at a big street dance on the evening of August 27. In the count today, Opal Burch of Salem, sponsored by Louie Lachmond, is in the lead of the 13 queen candidates; she is closely followed by Georgia Housler, sponsored by Williams Drug company; third is Bette Wattenburger, sponsored by Harpole and Coon; fourth is Imogene Tidd, sponsored by the Willamette Aerie Eagles; fifth is Zelma Thompson, sponsored by Frank Ellis club and Frank Muhleman. The coronation ceremonies for the queen of the Hop Fiesta to be held here August 27 to 30 inclusive, will take place on the opening evening of the celebration.

Mayor Gives Crown
Mayor A. L. Thomas of Independence will crown the Fiesta queen, and an elaborate coronation will be presented under the direction of Paul Robison, Mrs. Elsie Bolt, and Mrs. Maurice J. Butler. Special lighting equipment will be installed in the Hop Bowl, the independence municipal auditorium, particularly for the coronation. Distinguished citizens of several valley towns will act as escorts to the members of the Fiesta royal court, which, in addition to the queen, will be composed of a crown princess and four princesses. The hop-land royalty will be selected on next Wednesday evening, from a group of 13 young ladies who are competing for the honor of ruling over the celebration.

Expect Biggest Best
This year's Fiesta is expected to climax all previous festivals held in this section of the Willamette valley. Events scheduled to take place during the four-day show include: a Cinderella pageant, a rodeo, monkey polo games, midnight frolic revue, races, a carnival and grand floral and wild west parade.

Woodburn Will Seek WPA Work

WOODBURN, Aug. 20.—The regular meeting of the city council was held Tuesday and the following business transacted. The street commissioner was authorized to repair the street where new water mains had recently been installed; the mayor and recorder were given authority to make an application for a blank project for WPA work next winter which will give the city the privilege of handling men on any city work where work is needed.

Complaint was made by Chas. Saunders and George Stuckey that tennis players at the Library Park square were damaging the roof of their building by climbing to find lost balls, and Councilman H. M. Austin was authorized to spend about \$50 to provide a screen or other necessary protection for the building. An offer was made for the purchase of the Schermer property on Hayes street recently acquired by the city, the price offered being \$700 the purchaser to furnish the funds for abstract. The offer was accepted. City Marshal Alfred Ashland made application for a pair of handcuffs and application was granted. The water board was instructed to bring its plans at the next meeting for a new pump house. This building will be built of concrete and will cost approximately \$3,000. Recorder George Beach was instructed to hire an engineer to draw a map of property adjoining and street improvements made on East Lincoln street. L. M. Sweet of Salem has been procured for the work.

Hold Funeral For A. Johnston, 82

JEFFERSON, Aug. 20.—Funeral services for James Johnston, 82, who died Friday at the home of her brother, James Johnston, were held Sunday afternoon from the local Christian church. Rev. J. In 1919 she came to Oregon with her brother, James Johnston of Jefferson, at whose home she passed away. Early in life Miss Johnston joined the Presbyterian church and was a member until her death. Surviving are two brothers, James Johnston of Jefferson, and Jonas Johnston of Niagara Falls, Ontario, Canada. Interment was in the Jefferson cemetery, under the direction of a local mortician.
