

Serious Drama, Musical Comedy, Revivals on Movie Bills

"His Brother's Wife" is the title of the picture which came to the Elsinore theatre yesterday with attractive co-starring team of Barbara Stanwyck and Robert Taylor.

'Spendthrift' Is At Capitol Today

Mary Brian Playing First
Heavy Dramatic Role;
Fonda Featured

Her first "heavy" role in a brilliant stage and screen career is played by Mary Brian in the new Walter Wanger production, "Spendthrift," opening today at the Capitol theatre. The picture features Henry Fonda, sensational star of "The Moon's Our Home" and leading character in "Trail of the Lonesome Pine," together with Pat Paterson, Henry Barbery, and a host of outstanding players.

Miss Brian, a demure screen "sweetheart" since she immortalized the role of "Wendy" in the film version of "Peter Pan," is cast as a southern belle with gold-digging proclivities, who marries Fonda when she believes him a millionaire and deserts him when she learns he is penniless, only to turn up again when he begins to recoup his fortune.

"Spendthrift" is the fast-moving story of a young millionaire who cannot say "no" to a friend, and who as a result finds that he has let his entire fortune—\$23,000,000—slip through his fingers. He holds off creditors by promising that his prized race horse will win the Kentucky derby and enable him to pay all his bills. He sells a string of polo ponies to get to the derby.

The horse is disqualified. Fonda, broke, has to start from scratch. Few of his friends remain to aid him, and the woman he marries is revealed in her true light. At the close he finds romance closer to home—in the person of Miss Paterson, daughter of the trainer he has employed in his stable.

"Sing, Baby, Sing" Showing at Grand

Alice Faye, Menjou, Other
Stars in Music Play

Whooping with laughs, tingling with tunes, sizzling with swing and ablaze with names, "Sing, Baby, Sing," opened at the Grand theatre yesterday and revealed itself as a mad jamboree of fun-makers, stars and stogees, songsters and show-stoppers, that is one of the most hilarious triumphs ever brought to the screen.

Four new songs, "Love Will Tell," "Sing, Baby, Sing," "You Turned the Tables on Me," and "When Did You Leave Heaven?" provide musical interludes for the never-ending laughs.

The public hearing called by Solon T. White, state agricultural director, to determine whether the state market act shall be invoked on certain farm commodities will be held at the Y.M.C.A. Monday afternoon. The meeting was originally scheduled for the chamber of commerce, but due to construction work on the building was moved.

The meeting is called to give anyone an opportunity to be heard on the necessity of invoking the marketing act passed by the legislature. White declared that the rising prices of commodities had made the lessened need for the act and that as far as he could learn there was very little agitation among producers to have the law put into effect.

The agricultural department has discretionary powers as to invoking the provisions of the act.
