The reichsfuehrer blamed for his act in increasing the reich army. French official circles agreed that the only apparent way to keep their country out of a general European "revolution" caused by the Spanish struggle was the cementing of a neutrality pact.

England meanwhile concerned herself with attempts to obtain the powers support in a joint protest against reported "atrocities" by each of the Spanish belligerents in violation of international custom in warfare.

The German press continued its attacks on Soviet Russia, one newspaper numbering the Russian standing army at 9,000,000 men.

In Moscow no official comment was forthcoming on the German-French situation.

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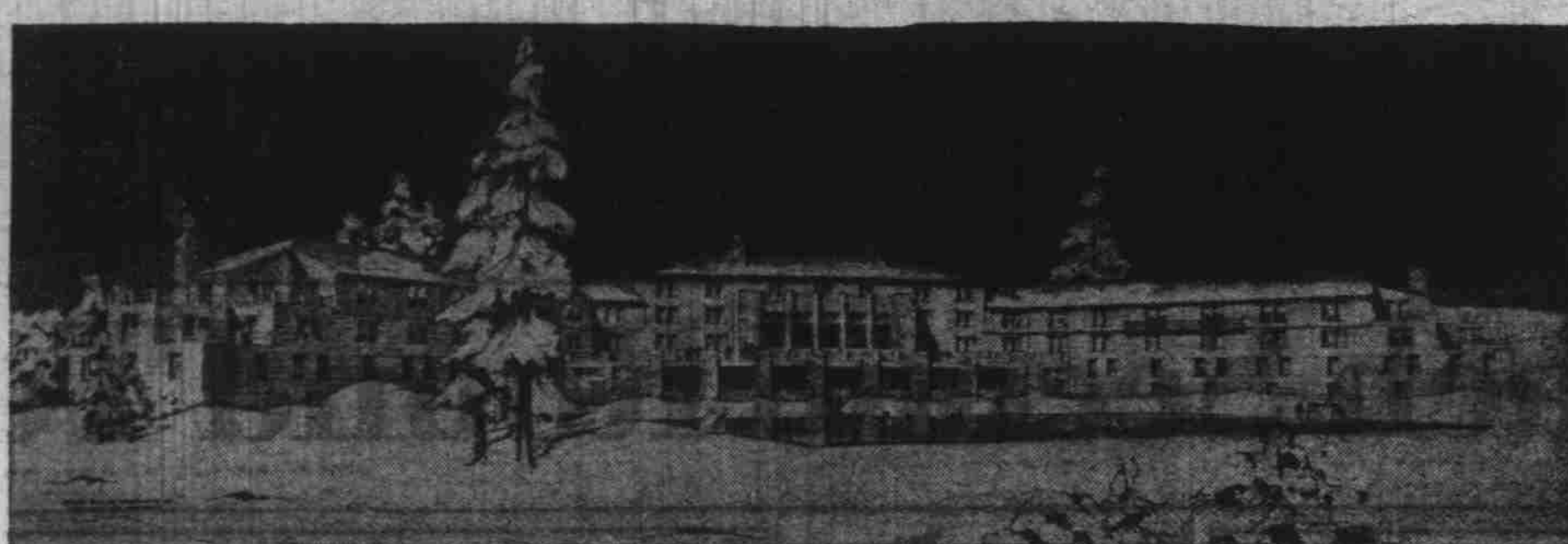
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Sun Valley Lodge, New Idaho Winter Sports Mecca

Sun Valley Lodge and its surrounding terrain is expected to be the winter sports mecca of America and to rival in magnificence similar European resorts in various European

countries. Skiing, skating, sleighing, tobogganing, dog sledding and other typical winter outdoor activities will be featured at this hotel. Adjacent to the lodge will be a glass-enclosed natural hot water swimming pool. The ski courses will be under the supervision of renowned skiing experts. The lodge will have accommodations for 200 guests. It is located on a 3300 acre ranch

a mile and a half north of Ketchum in Sun Valley where the surrounding mountains of the Sawtooth range protect it from the severe winter winds. Sun Valley is located in central southern Idaho northeast of Boise. declines here are not to be expected.

Thus far the county board of equalization, which held its first meeting August 19, has had few complaints of unfair assessments. Yesterday marked the final day for the filing of assessment complaints and only a handful had been received. Majority of these came from the Federal Land bank at Spokane which customarily files requests for lowered assessment on much of the property on which it holds mortgages.

The equalization board, under the Oregon code, must complete its findings within one month from the time of its first meeting. The board by law consists of the assessor, the county clerk and the county judge.

As soon as all assessments in the county have been recorded in the tax books for 1937, the next task for the assessor will be that of extending the millage levies for 1937 against the assessed value of all property in the county. These extensions cannot be made until the various cities, the county, school districts and the state have made their levies for 1937.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The killing of two Japanese and wounding of two others in Chengtu, Szechuen, assumed tonight the proportions of a new international incident as Japanese officials prepared to lodge "vigorous representations" with the Chinese government.

Szechuen authorities notified the Chinese national government of the affair.

(From Peiping came word that three British soldiers had been fired upon as they returned to their barracks from a moving picture show. One soldier was wounded in the leg.

(Apprehension was heightened when it was rumored the attack was instigated by Japanese seeking to avenge the slaying of a Japanese soldier May 26. British soldiers were accused of the May 26 attack by Japanese officials, but were freed by a British consular court after a trial.)

CLEVELAND, Aug. 25.—(AP)—A threat by the judge to "throw" rival lawyers "out of court bodily" when one cried "liar!" concluded today a hearing in which Dr. Francis E. Townsend described the financial operations of his Old Age Revolving Pensions, Ltd.

The lean, elderly Dr. Townsend had testified the pension movement "would go to pieces overnight" without his leadership when Attorney Charles H. Hubbell arose and pointed to Ben F. Sacharow, attorney for the Rev. Alfred J. Wright, ousted Townsend director, in a \$1,000,000 accounting suit against the organization.

"A paper, he submitted here last night was stolen from our files," said Hubbell, representing Townsend interests, "by Robert E. Clements (former national secretary of the Townsend organization). It proves he (Sacharow) is in Clements' employ. He called me a liar yesterday."

Sacharow leaped to his feet. "I'll call you a contemptible liar again," he shouted, "and a peddler of perjury."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—(AP)—President Roosevelt turned westward tonight for his long planned drought inspection tour after a series of governmental and political conferences, high-spotted by a renewed pledge of support from Senator Carter Glass.

One of the first presidential callers during the day, Senator Glass came out of an officially announced political conference at the white house with a statement he was going to vote for the reelection of Mr. Roosevelt.

Asked if the president requested him to speak for the new deal ticket, the 73-year old Virginian, who has opposed some of the chief executive's financial and spending policies said:

"He did not." But he volunteered quickly: "If you want to know whether I'm going to vote for the reelection of the president, I am. I never had any other idea."

"I don't know if I'm going to speak in the campaign or not. My doctors say I'm not to, but they said the same thing in 1932."

Siam Is Topic of Kiwanis Speaker

A. R. Hammond, who has spent 11 years in Siam, and one time taught in Bangkok Christian college, spoke at yesterday noon's meeting of the Salem Kiwanis club at the Marion hotel on "Impressions of Siam," describing the country and its people.

He said that Siam was a country 1000 miles long in its longest part and 500 miles wide in its greatest width, containing 12 million people. Men and women of the country dressed identically up until 15 or 20 years ago, and wore the same type of headgear, he told his audience. Because they chew beetle-nut, they have black teeth, and black false teeth are preferred to white ones.

He told a Siamese folk story, "Four Jolly Robbers," to illustrate two of their sayings, "If you are living among people with their eyes closed, keep your eyes closed too," and "A little bit of water will not put out a fire."

The absolute monarchy of the country maintained its power over the people through force, superstition, and honesty and fairness in dealing out justice, Mr. Hammond said.
