Plank suffered a fractured neck and numerous abrasions to his body in the fatal accident. He said Mrs. Plank had read the account of the car crash at Monmouth but had had no intimation the man who had been killed was her husband until Wednesday.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed last night. After identifying her husband's body, Mrs. Plank was taken to the hospital by District Attorney William H. Trindle to interview. He had maintained until yesterday that no one had been in the car with him. Yesterday he said that someone was in the car but he did not know who it was. Last night under questioning by Trindle and Mrs. Plank, he admitted that he knew yesterday who the dead man was, Trindle said.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—(P)—The national association of saxophone players was born at a historic meeting today with the avowed purpose of winning "admiration and respect" for a fallen instrument.

Arthur Cremin, director of the New York schools of music, launched the movement with a declaration of independence for saxophone players and a demand that they be accorded a place in the symphonic spotlight.

Corn Crop Helped By Copious Rains

CHICAGO, Aug. 26.—(P)—Some improvement in weather and crop conditions in corn belt states were noted in weekly summaries of state observers today following recent rains.

"Further deterioration of the Iowa corn crop was arrested," commented C. D. Reed, federal meteorologist. He said that while last week's rains covered all portions of the state the drought was in "no sense broken" in central and western counties.

Iowa last night shared in scattered rains which fell also in much of Wisconsin, Michigan, northern Illinois and Indiana. Scattered rains were reported also in Texas but hot weather persisted in the southwest.

Temperatures were lower in the Dakotas, Nebraska and Iowa, however, as President Roosevelt's special train carried him from Chicago toward the drought areas.

Lumber Workers Go Out on Strike

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Aug. 26.—(P)—With the cause of their walkout a matter of hearsay, workers at the Consolidated, Conacher, and Interstate lumber companies continued on strike today.

The 650 men involved failed to come to work yesterday morning. Unofficial reports said the strike resulted from disputes over the pay scale of steelworkers.

It was learned today that the loggers had held a meeting in the Legion hall here yesterday. Union executives said a statement explaining the controversy and setting forth their position was being drafted.

The three resumed operations about two months ago after an extended shutdown.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Aug. 26.—(P)—Mrs. Clark P. Terwilliger, about 60, was instantly killed tonight when struck by a car driven by Vern J. Peek, Salem.

ATLANTA, Aug. 26.—(P)—Secretary of State John Wilson reported the theft today of the plates of the great seal of Georgia and attributed it to an act of "political trickery."

Wilson said the plates were removed from a safe in his office at the state house shortly before noon along with 200 political letters on a nearby table.

Law School Sees Enrollment Gain

With books sufficient to bring its library to accredited standing, the Willamette university law school expects an enrollment of 60 full-time students this fall, Dean Roy M. Lockenour announced yesterday. The attendance at the school will probably be double that of three years ago.

Dean Lockenour said no students will be admitted to the school, except as "specials" until they have completed two full years of liberal arts work as a preliminary requirement.

For several years the Willamette university law school has sought national recognition as a fully accredited school. Bringing the library to the standards required by the national association of accredited law schools is thought to have removed the major barrier to such recognition.

Dean Lockenour and Librarian Spencer of the university library, have spent the bulk of the summer cataloging the law library and preparing better quarters for it in the lower floor of Waller hall on the university campus.

Strict Department Rules For Officers Handed Out at Meeting

Instructions to check orders and see that they are obeyed to make conversation brief, plain and courteous, to be loyal to fellow officers and to remember that they represented no particular group of society but owed allegiance to the enforcement of laws to the people of the city and nation.

Officers are warned not to enter any place of business while on duty, except in line of duty, not to loiter, sit or lean in card rooms, beer halls or other public places, not to discuss politics or superior to others, not to drive cars at excessive speeds except when a serious condition makes it necessary, not to act in abusive or tyrannical manner and not to leave post or beat until relieved.

The instruction state: "This is not to be considered a complete list of all orders, but is supplemental to any other order and regulation heretofore given and to such orders and regulations as may be made or given at a future date."

"Please be advised that every caution and instruction above, is an order from the Chief of Police of Salem, Oregon, and is to be strictly obeyed at all times hereafter."

Ban Oregon Men At Grand Coulee

SPOKANE, Aug. 26.—(P)—Spokane national reemployment service officials confirmed today a report from Washington, D. C., headquarters of an order barring further employment of Oregon men on the Grand Coulee dam project.

The report followed a recent protest by Okanogan county commissioners against the employment of Oregon men when, they said, men were available in the counties adjacent to the project.

The NRS officials also revealed a report, dated July 21, that 100 men had been employed from Oregon, but only after extensive checks showed no laborers of the type needed were available in Washington.

200 Given Private Jobs At Oregon City Office

OREGON CITY, Ore., Aug. 26.—(P)—The Oregon City employment office announced through Manager L. C. Stoll that more than 200 persons had been placed on private jobs during the past two weeks.

Stoll said Marion county hop pickers had taken about 100 men, with others being placed with the Grand Coulee and Bonneville dams and on highway construction work.

Pendleton Escape Found at Eugene

EUGENE, Aug. 26.—(P)—Willard Carman, recently escaped from the eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton, was found near here today.

A party of men discovered Carman on a mountain trail eight miles above Oakridge, exhausted and too weak to walk after having apparently walked all the way from Pendleton. It was believed he had not eaten for several days.

Carman was brought to Eugene in an ambulance and will be taken to the state hospital at Salem.

Mexican Senators Riot; Ten Injured

MEXICO CITY, D. F., Aug. 26.—(P)—Ten persons were injured tonight as chairs, fists and pistol bullets were swung in a riot in the senate chambers.

Factions battled when a left wing bloc of senators met to vote their own dissolution. Fifty police reserves were called to restore order and to eject the trouble makers.

Doing away with the powerful leftist bloc, while unlikely to have great influence on congressional policies, was expected to simplify legislative procedure.
