

Thousands Attend Funeral of Olson

Priest, Lutheran Minister and Rabbi Pay Tribute to Minnesota Chief

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 26.—(P)—Forty-four years of Gov. Floyd Olson's life, terminated by death, was mirrored today in funeral services for Minnesota's first citizen.

His passing was mourned by notables and the man in the street, who thronged the city auditorium and watched the funeral cortege in numbers estimated by Adj. Gen. E. A. Walsh to be 150,000.

Almost a score of women either were overcome or fainted. The thousands that occupied all the 13,070 seats in the auditorium told the story of Governor Olson's career—friends, colleagues, politicians, the curious, laborers whose poverty the dead man experienced as a poor newsboy; a millionaire, whose close friend he was at the height of his popularity.

With bowed heads they paid tribute to Governor Olson, leaving to a Catholic priest, Gov. Philip LaFollette of Wisconsin, a Lutheran minister, and a Jewish rabbi, among whose people the late governor grew to manhood, and put into words the respect and honor due the United States' only farmer-labor governor.

Said Governor LaFollette in a funeral oration delivered from amid floral offerings that filled eleven trucks:

"Not an enemy in Minnesota ever saw the back of Floyd Olson. Floyd Olson understood the social usefulness of selfish individualism was ended. He saw there must be a new spirit of co-operation."

Lawrence McNary Dies at Portland

Cousin of Senator Former Resident Here; Rites Scheduled Friday

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 26.—(P)—Lawrence A. McNary, 70, long prominent in Oregon legal circles, died at his home here late today. He had been ill about three months.

McNary was one of an illustrious family, being a cousin of Senator Charles L. McNary and Federal Judge John McNary and a brother of Dr. Wilson D. McNary, superintendent of the eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton.

Born in 1866 in The Dalles, McNary moved to Salem with his family in 1872 when his father, Hugh M. McNary, sold his eastern Oregon farm. He attended the Salem schools and Willamette University and then came to Portland to study law in the offices of C. H. Carey and Richard and Emmett Williams.

He was graduated from the University of Oregon law school in 1890 and was admitted to the bar the same year.

Was City Attorney From 1902 to 1907, he served as city attorney in the administrations of Mayor George H. Williams and Mayor Harry Lane. Having no desire for political prominence he sought no other public offices. He studied United States history as a hobby.

His wife, the former Alice Haskell, survives him. The couple were married November 16, 1914. Other brothers and sisters surviving are A. P. McNary, Nabton; Miss Anna McNary, Portland; Mrs. Ira Smith, Marshfield, and

Funeral services will be 1 p. m. Friday from J. P. Finley & Sons chapel. Interment will be in the City View cemetery, Salem.

Aumsville School Costs Are Lowest

H. S. Expenses \$61.08 Per Capita; Salem Fifth Upon County List

The Aumsville high school organization had the lowest per capita cost of any high school in the county for the 1935-1936 school year according to figures compiled this week for the non-high school district of the county. Aumsville's per pupil cost was \$61.08. Nearest school to Aumsville in low costs was Hubbard with \$72.59 per capita. Jefferson being third with \$73.50. Gervais high school ranks fourth from low in the per capita charge, its costs being \$76.01 for the year. Salem was fifth with \$83.34.

Other schools, in order of their per capita high school costs, were: Silverton, \$84.06; Stayton, \$86.52; Woodburn, \$88.62; Mill City, \$96.33; Turner, \$97.03; Gates, \$103.63.

Tuition costs for non-high school areas totalled \$77,104 for the year just concluded, of which \$1880 when for interest on warrants. Salem had the largest number of out-of-district pupils with 529 enrolling. Silverton was second with 154; Woodburn third with 126.

When the non-union high school board recently settled with the high school districts, \$26,333 of its bills were paid for in cash; \$50,500 was issued in warrants, all of which will be retired by the county treasurer before next year's bills come in.

School Districts Lower Their Debt

Warrants Outstanding Are Reduced, Cash on Hand Would Pay Them All

Marion county's 119 school districts have made outstanding progress in getting out of debt since depression found them, four years ago, with a heavy warrant load. The annual compilation of the financial statistics of each district show that warrants at the end of the 1936 fiscal year totalled only \$86,334 compared to \$336,290 four years ago. The aggregate cash on hand of the districts totalled \$99,053, enough to extinguish the warrant debt if all warrants issued and not paid, had been called.

The bonded debt of the districts has also been materially reduced, the summary shows, save for school district No. 24, Salem, whose issue of \$675,000 during the past year, swelled the total obligations of the schools of the county. Aside from this bond issue and smaller issues of other districts, the aggregate bond debt of all schools of the county stood at \$125,229 as the year ended, compared to \$336,290 four years ago.

The Salem district had reduced its bonded debt to \$27,000, when the new issue for a senior, and junior high school, and a grade school, was issued. Other schools to put out bonds and the amount issued during the year were: Gervais \$11,000; Turner \$3000; Liberty \$1800; Silverton \$600.

Only 30 districts of the county had any warrants outstanding and unpaid as the fiscal year closed.
