Recent New Highs

Salem was not alone in reaching a new record as reports came in from other Willamette valley and coastal points. All were reporting new highs for the year.

The weather prediction for today gave no indication of relief from the heat. The forecast was for continued clear skies with little change in temperature.

So far as was known last night, only one fire of any size was burning in Oregon timber. That one was located in the Seven Devils section of Coos county. Additional men were being enlisted to fight the fire which has been burning for several days. It was out of control yesterday and burning in valuable timber.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 27. (AP)—Temperatures soared in Oregon today and with the hot weather came announcement of the most serious fire hazard of the season.

Records for the year tumbled throughout the Willamette valley and on the coast, with Portland reporting a top of 91 degrees, Eugene 92, and Cannon Beach 94. At Medford the thermometer reached 96, while Pendleton was comparatively cool with a reading of 87.

SILVERTON, Aug. 27. (AP)—Loggers for Silver Falls Timber company were forced to come out Thursday night for the first time this season. Low humidity was given as the reason. Humidity registered 24, it was reported.

The order to vacate came from the state forestry department and the entire crew of 175 men reached Silverton Thursday night. Orders are to remain out until Monday. The camp is situated about 30 miles east of Silverton.

Riis Family Will Work For Landon

NEW YORK, Aug. 27. (AP)—Republican headquarters to a fight made public a letter in which Mrs. Oscar Riis Owe of Minneapolis, daughter of the late Jacob Riis, close friend of Theodore Roosevelt, was represented as saying she and a brother and sister would support Governor Alf M. Landon this fall.

Mrs. Owe was quoted as saying she wrote Republican Chairman John D. M. Hamilton pledging support to Landon because Mrs. Jacob Riis, widow of the former civic leader was represented in an announcement by the democratic national committee a month ago as intending to work for the re-election of President Roosevelt.

Lane Man Injured In Queen Shooting

COQUILLE, Ore., Aug. 27. (AP)—Frank Ware, 35, of Springfield, victim of the strange shooting Tuesday night near Fort Orford, was improving today after an operation for the bullet wound in his back.

E. Roberts, 73, a Springfield neighbor of Ware's, was found asleep with a revolver in his hand the morning after Ware was shot as he slept in the cabin occupied by the two men.

Roberts told state police he remembered having a nightmare in which he thought he was being held up. He said he carried the revolver with him for protection against holdups.

Gold Beach authorities were holding Roberts, although no charges had been filed against him.

Rogas Executed For Slaying Son

NEW YORK, Aug. 27. (AP)—His body shaking as he was led into the death chamber, Charles Rogas, 35, of Brooklyn, N. Y., convicted of killing his three-year-old son, Alfred, was put to death in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison tonight.

Earlier in the day, Rogas asked for a drink of liquor. A prison rule prevented granting of the request.

"I drank myself into this trouble," he said, "and I'd like to drink myself out of it."

Rogas allegedly poisoned his son, Alfred, and then killed his wife, Lillian, with a hammer. As he struck her, police charged, she fell over their child, Winifred, 19 months old, smothering her to death.

Rogas was convicted only on the charge of killing his son.

Guns Half Around World to Boom Today; War Secretary Dies

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specialist, summoned by the president.

Mr. Roosevelt had been informed several weeks ago that the secretary's recovery was doubtful.

On learning of his war chief's passing, President Roosevelt directed that Secretary Hull issue a proclamation designating the death as "a national bereavement" and ordering flags on all public buildings in the District of Columbia and the state of Utah to half staff.

The war department sent messages to all posts of the military establishment in this country, Alaska, Panama, Hawaii, the Philippines and Tientsin, China, to observe 30 days' mourning. All officers will wear mourning bands on their arms and their sabers.

Secretary of War George H. Dern made an official visit to Oregon when in 1932 he attended a conference of governors held in Portland at the invitation of

then-Governor Julius L. Meier. Dern took a prominent part in the deliberations which were in the deliberations which were in October, before the election of President Roosevelt. At that time he was actively supporting the New Deal.

In the summer of 1934 he returned to Oregon as secretary of war and met President Roosevelt at Portland when the latter landed there from Honolulu aboard the Destroyer Houston. He accompanied the president on his trip east.

Salem citizens who met him on these two occasions spoke of Dern as a pleasant, vigorous western man, much interested in the improvement of conditions for all over in his home state of Utah. He played a modest part in the New Deal cabinet although the war department, called upon to supervise the CCC program early in 1933, and later to handle the United States mails, had heavy administrative duties during his administration.
