Large Sums Paid On Job Insurance

Hartwig Tells Lions Here of Compensation Plan and Administration

Oregon employers already have paid \$225,000 into the state unemployment fund, upon which the unemployment compensation commission may begin to draw in 1938. Otto Hartwig, commission public relations director, told the Salem Lions club, ninety-five percent of the state employers have complied with provisions of the unemployment act and of these 96 already have made their contributions to the fund.

That Oregon's attempt, along with other states, to relieve the unemployment situation during critical financial periods, is not in its final form but is largely experimental in nature, was explained by Hartwig. "We have a problem before us," he said. "We are trying to solve it."

The bookkeeping mechanics of Oregon's jobless aid system as set up by the commission, among the simplest in the nation, Hartwig declared. He asserted the commission was attempting to avoid placing an unnecessary burden on employers by demanding useless frequent reports.

Intent is limited to help when a man needs credit most, Hartwig said. "This is an act designed for the worker and not just the man who floats and doesn't want to work."

Under the plan as now set up, Hartwig told the clubmen, workers who have been out of a job three weeks will in 1938 be entitled to half of their previous wages with a maximum of \$15 and minimum of \$7.50 a week. This assistance, however, will not be available to persons whose salaries have ranged over \$30 a week.

Displaying a graph showing periods of prosperity and depression in the United States for the last 105 years, Hartwig held out the unemployment compensation idea as an equalizer between the financial ups and the downs of society.

Jacob Hopfinger Called by Death

SILVERTON, Aug. 27.—Jacob Hopfinger, 66, died Thursday morning at a Salem hospital after an extended illness. Funeral arrangements, not yet completed, are in charge of Ekman's.

Hopfinger was born May 29, 1872, near the Black Sea in Russia, but came to this country when very young. He was married in South Dakota before coming on to Oregon. His widow and the following children survive: Frances Shummen and Sally Ferrell of Seattle; Anna Foltz and Bernard Hopfinger of Portland; and Jake, Joe, Edward and Maxine of Silverton.

Federal Agencies To Have Exhibits

Six federal agencies will have exhibits at the Oregon state fair at Salem, September 7th to 13th, according to an announcement by Edgar Freed, state director for the national emergency council. Those agencies are the federal housing administration, works progress administration, public works administration, soil conservation service, resettlement administration and the U. S. army engineers.

"Each of the participating agencies," said Mr. Freed, "will have an exhibit which will show the work which is being done by it in the state of Oregon. The public is invited to visit these displays and see how each agency is operating throughout the state."

Reclamation Meet Is Set Next Week

Inspection of the 18 million dollar Owyhee reclamation project will be a major feature of the twenty-sixth annual meeting of the Oregon Reclamation congress scheduled for September 4 and 5 at Yale, announces Dr. W. L. Pover, secretary of the congress and head of the soils department at Oregon State college.

Because of the large number of new settlers in Malheur valley, the program is being arranged to include a number of talks dealing with the use of water. Supplementing these will be field trips on which will be seen demonstrations of the newest methods of reclaiming alkali land and applying water to soils of that district.

Reclamation problems of the entire state will be discussed, as well as national reclamation policies, by a list of well-known officials who will attend. Invited speakers include John C. Page, acting commissioner of the bureau of reclamation, Judge O. S. Worden, president of the National Reclamation association; John W. Haw, agricultural and industrial agent of the Northern Pacific; Senators Charles McNary and Fred Steiwer; Col. E. C. Robins, U. S. district engineer, and William Peterson, director of the Utah State college extension service.

The drainage section of the congress will be in charge of a session at which the drainage problems of the lower Columbia and the Willamette valley will be presented. Among those who will speak at this session are W. G. Sloan and W. G. Brown, consulting engineers of Boise, Idaho, and Portland, respectively.

Ram Prices Higher Sale's Second Day

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Sheepmen from the western range opened wide their money bags an unpaid record price for aristocratic additions to their flocks.

Bidding jumped at the closing day of the annual ram sale of the National Wool Growers' association, after ramballies brought unexpected low prices.

James Laidlaw of Muldoon, Idaho, paid the top price of \$1,000 today for a two-year-old Suffolk ram offered by the Suffolkdale Meadows farm of Iderton, Ontario, Canada. The ram was undefeated champion of the 1935 Royal Canadian show.

Twenty-seven Suffolk rams brought an average of \$193.33 each today, compared with last year's high of \$161.45 for 16 rams. Hampshire rams as demanded picked up for mutton animals. Seventeen rams sold for an average of \$168.33 compared with \$121.55 for 16 rams a year ago.

Department Will Back Milk Survey

The state agricultural department will cooperate with, rather than oppose, any milk survey in Oregon, provided it is conducted in such a way as not to alarm or disturb the present dairy set-up, Selon T. White, state agricultural director, declared Thursday.

White denied press reports that he would oppose a statewide survey.

Circus Midget Recalls His Early Days in Salem; Weighs 40 Pounds

Clarence Chesterfield Howerton is his name and he is 23 years old, two feet tall and weighs 40 pounds.

And he is a native of Salem! It was "home day" yesterday for this midget at the Cole circus on 15th and Madison streets for it was 585 South 12th street, in a house owned by Mrs. Sarah McKay, that "Major Mite" was born.

"You bet, I like the west better than the east," said the "major" yesterday. "Boy, was it hot down in Missouri!"

Talking to Mrs. McKay, Major Mite recalled that he has five older brothers, all six feet or more in height and that several of them were born in Salem. Several of them are following the circus trade, one is manager of a large store in Ogden, Utah.

14 Years in Circus
With "Major Mite" travels his mother, who has remarried since she lived in Salem and is now Mrs. Crawford.

"Major Mite" has been 14 years in the circus game and likes it. "I spent 13 years with Ringling brothers," he told Mrs. McKay. "This is my first year with Cole's."

The major is boyish appearing although his slightly wrinkled face gives away his age as more than that of a youth. He talks in a high pitched voice. One thing he remembers about Salem was that the family home was not far from the state blind school.

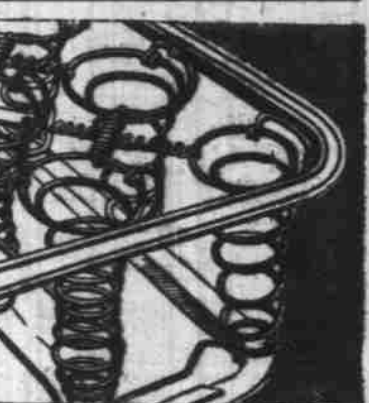

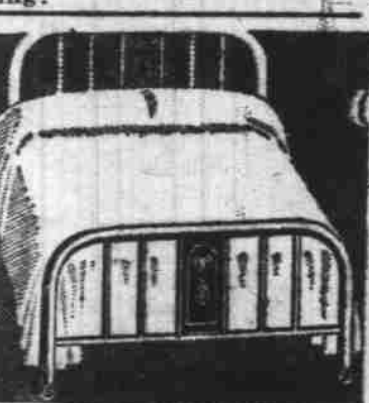
