

Peach Canning Now at Height

Fruit Being Served Fresh
Also; Various Ways of
Preparing Listed

Peaches are at their peak right now and if one has recently talked to a housewife, she has no doubt been preserving peaches or tried some novel way of fixing them.

Peaches always make a delightful dish for any meal in the late summer season. They are served for breakfast, fruit, used in salads for luncheons or dinners, and come in very handy for making desserts either for everyday meals, afternoon bridge parties or luncheons.

Peaches in Paradise
3 eggs
1 cup sugar
4 tablespoons cold water
1 cup pastry flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
2 tablespoons melted hot butter
Beat eggs well, add sugar and beat until thick. Add water and beat again. Sift dry ingredients and whip into batter. Add extract and hot butter. Bake in round or oval mold in a moderate oven. Cool.

Filling
1 1/2 cups peach halves, fresh or canned
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 tablespoon gelatin
If canned fruit is used, drain juice and bring to the boiling point. Add lemon juice and gelatin softened in a little cold water. Add more sugar if desired. Cool almost to point of congealing, then whip. Arrange peach halves in bottom of cake, pour the jelly over and set aside to chill. Before serving pile on top 1 cup of whipped cream, sweetened and flavored with almond. Garnish with shredded almonds. If fresh fruit is used, a mild flavored jelly such as strawberry or orange is better than gelatin. Fine for Sunday night back yard picnic suppers.

Cup 'N' Saucer Salad
Sliced canned pineapple
Slices of canned peaches
Cream cheese
Whipped cream
Fruit salad dressing
Red cherries
Chopped nuts
The pineapple forms the saucer and the unpurified peach the cup which is filled with a small ball of cream cheese and a few chopped pecan nuts. Pour fruit salad dressing over all. Top with whipped cream and garnish with a red cherry.

Peach Mousse
1 cup double cream
1 cup peach pulp
5 tablespoons sugar
2 egg whites
1-16 ts. salt
Whip cream, peel and slice ripe peaches and the unpurified peach the cup which is filled with a small ball of cream cheese and a few chopped pecan nuts. Pour fruit salad dressing over all. Top with whipped cream and garnish with a red cherry.

Peach Gelatin Salad
1 package orange flavored gelatin
2 cups boiling water
2 tb. lemon juice
8 halves sliced peaches
1/2 cup red cherries
Pour boiling water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved, add lemon juice. Pour to the thickness of 1 1/4 inches in a shallow pan, which has been rinsed in cold water. Set in cool place. When a little stiff add peaches and cherries. Chill until stiff. Cut in squares and serve with a little dab of mayonnaise.

Pimento Pickles
6 quarts small cucumbers—sliced very fine
12 sliced onions

1 small can of pimento
1 small cup of salt
Let this stand for three hours.
1/2 quarts vinegar
6 cups sugar
3 ts. tumeric powder
1/2 cup white mustard seed

Tomato Conserve
1 qt. tomatoes
1 pt. of diced tart apples
2 lemons
4 cups sugar
2-3 cup English walnut meats
Cut the lemons in thin slices and cover with water. Cook until tender and add the other ingredients. Cook until thick. Blanch the walnuts and cut them in small pieces. Stir the nutmeats into the hot tomato mixture. Pour into hot sterilized jars and seal.

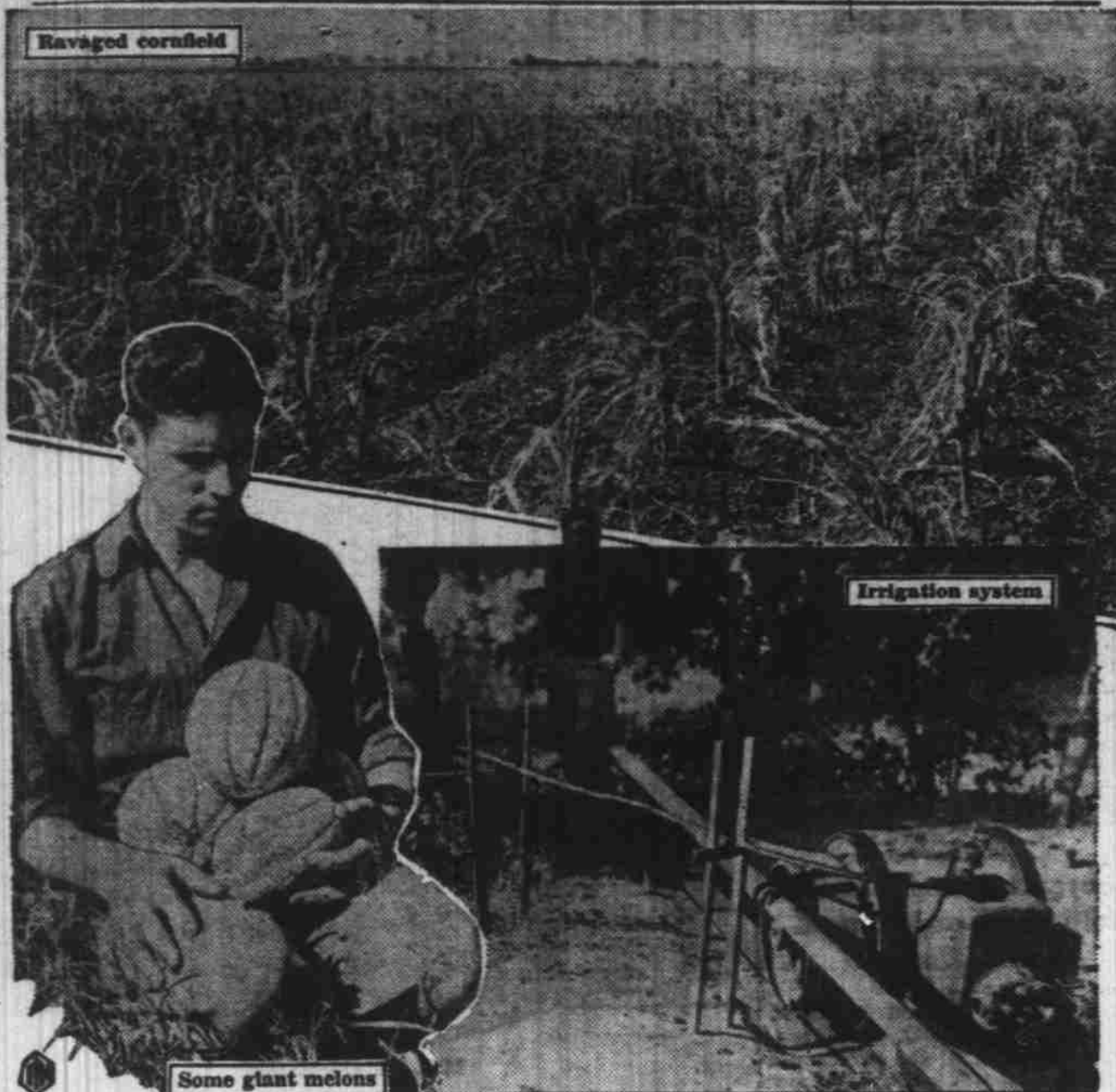
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Contrasting Scenes in Stricken Drouth Area



These contrasting scenes in the midwestern farm belt suggest in graphic fashion the importance of water in the drouth area. At the top is a cornfield near Utica, Neb., where the yield would normally have been about 40 bushels per acre, but where the drouth has completely ruined the crop. On the farm of John Beery, near Kansas City, Mo., however, the proximity of the Little Blue river made it possible for Farmer Beery to fix up a home-made irrigation system, pumping water from the river, which made possible the raising of a bumper crop, including such giant melons as Beery is shown gathering for market in nearby Kansas City.

Pickling Season Here; Housewives Prepare For Times When They Will Come in Handy; Recipes Suggested

Just around the corner is pickling season and every housewife will be looking for new and different recipes to make her pickling more successful. Pickles of all kinds whether relishes, conserves or dill and sweet pickles can be used all through the winter, spring and summer months for school lunches, Sunday night suppers, luncheons, dinners and picnics.

During the winter season when the mother must fix her child's school lunch, pickles will come in handy and be an attractive addition to his meal. In the spring picnic dinners, suppers, and weekends away from home all call for pickles of some variety in the menu. Following are a few pickle recipes which should give the housewife an inspiration to start pickling.

Pimento Pickles
6 quarts small cucumbers—sliced very fine
12 sliced onions
2 green peppers chopped
1 small can of pimento
1 small cup of salt
Let this stand for three hours.
1/2 quarts vinegar
6 cups sugar
3 ts. tumeric powder
1/2 cup white mustard seed

WOODBURN, Aug. 26.—Funeral services for Samuel F. Parker, 84, were held from the First Presbyterian church, Tuesday afternoon, with Rev. George R. Cromley officiating. Solos were by Mrs. Ivan Stewart of Salem and Mrs. O. F. Larson at the piano.

Pallbearers were D. B. Durette, Duke Bellverber, T. A. Dittmar, Mr. Kelsor, B. J. Miller and B. D. Cooley. Interment was in Turner cemetery.

Mr. Parker died at Milwaukie August 21, from injuries received when he was struck by an automobile on the Pacific highway near Island station.

He was born at Salem in 1852 and at the time of his death was one of the oldest native white persons in Marion county. His father crossed the plains in 1845 and took a donation claim about where the state penitentiary now stands. He spent his boyhood in Salem, lived in Portland 15 years and at Fairfield 20 years, and the remainder of his life at Woodburn. He was married to May Foss in 1880 and after her death married Anna Sundemeyer who died in Woodburn four years ago.

The following children survive: Mrs. Ida Jamieson of Milwaukie, Mrs. R. V. Perigo of Hood River, Mrs. J. C. Hugill of Woodburn, Mrs. R. W. Grafton of Portland, Samuel B. Parker and Frank F. Parker of Milwaukie. He was a member of the Presbyterian church at Fairfield, and always deeply interested in politics, having served as democratic committeeman in Woodburn for several years.

Jellied Chicken Loaf Suggested

For warm weather, the refrigerator is a great aid in making meal serving simple. Most of the food can be prepared in the morning and stored in the refrigerator for later meals. Jellied chicken loaf or any meat or fish loaf is always good for hot summer days for suppers and luncheons.

Jellied Chicken Loaf
(Meat or Fish can be used)
1 1/2 cups cooked chicken
1/2 cup diced celery
2 tablespoons chopped green peppers
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture
1 1/2 cups boiling water
1/2 cup salad dressing
1 teaspoon minced parsley
Pour water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved, cool and add rest of ingredients. Pour into mold and chill. Unmold and serve cut in slices.

Spiced Pear Pickles
Peel, core and cut into quarters one peck of pears. Steam until soft, meanwhile preparing the following:

Place in a preserving kettle 4 quarts vinegar and 2 pounds sugar. Add a thin bag containing 1 teaspoon whole cinnamon, 1 teaspoon allspice, 1/2 teaspoon whole cloves. When the vinegar comes hot, remove all scum, add the steamed pears. Scald up and they are ready to seal. Excellent with cold meats.

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Pickle Relish
(Using green tomatoes)
16 cups chopped green tomatoes
6 cups chopped green peppers
2 cups chopped onions
2 cups chopped cabbage
2 cups chopped celery
1/2 cup salt
2 tablespoons white mustard seed
2 tbs. yellow mustard seed
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. cloves
3 cups vinegar
1 2/3 cups sugar
Add salt to vegetables and soak over night or the equivalent time. Drain well, add rest of ingredients and simmer until mixture thickens. This usually requires about two hours. Stir frequently with
