Notice Comes of Chandler Choice

Formal notice of the nomination of Ben R. Chandler by the republican party of Oregon for county for the state senate was received at the state house yesterday. Chandler, former president of the University of Oregon Alumni association, is a banker in Marshfield and active in the timber business.

The district nominating committee of Oregon counties has named him to succeed the late John A. Biegler, Marshfield auto dealer, who won the republican nomination in May, then was killed on a Cleveland street by a car which struck him as he started to cross.

The position Chandler seeks is the one formerly occupied by John D. Goss who was instantly killed here last November when hit by a passenger bus.

Co-op Buying of Hose Considered

Discussion of a plan for cooperative buying of fire hose by Oregon cities will probably come up at the meeting of the executive committee of the League of Oregon cities, Mayor V. E. Kuhn said yesterday. The meeting is to be held tonight in Eugene. Mayor Kuhn, as vice-president and executive committee member, expects to attend.

A plan for cooperative buying of fire hose has been sponsored by the league for some time. Mayor Kuhn said. Some Salem councilmen are dubious of the plan, because the equipment would lack the guarantee of a recognized manufacturer. The present cost of the hose runs around \$1.50 a foot to the city. Supporters of the cooperative buying plan claim that an approved hose can be purchased for 65 cents a foot by elimination of sales cost and by buying in large quantities.

Relief Worker Is Killed on Highway

INDEPENDENCE, Aug. 28.—Severt Larson, 42, relief worker, met almost instant death on the highway near the Rio Vista farm near here last night when hit by an automobile driven by Perry Charles Reader of Oswego. His body was taken to Dallas by Sheriff Hooker, who was here at the time, and the county coroner announced that it is to be held until the driver of the car. It was believed that Larson had been drinking, as a bottle of liquor was found on his body. He was walking on the highway when struck by the automobile between 8 and 9 o'clock.

Prohi Petitions At W.C.T.U. Hall

Sponsors of the local option election announced that petitions will be available for signature at the W. C. T. U. hall. The petitions must be filed by Wednesday so it is expected they will be completed by Tuesday. Those backing the campaign say that they have met very good response in circulating the petitions.

Davis Estate Case Settled

Winslow Is Decreed Owner of 200 Acres, Trust to Retain Other Land

An end to litigation which has enveloped property left by the late Cornelia A. Davis of Turner for memorial homes was seen yesterday in the acceptance in circuit court of a settlement worked out between H. C. Epley, president of the Memorial Home association, and W. C. Winslow, representative for certain creditors. Under the settlement 200 acres of land owned by the late Mrs. Davis become Winslow's property while two other tracts, including the one on which a \$15,000 home was erected, remain with the trust.

The property was at first taken over by the Eugene Bible school; that institution went into receivership and bills it had incurred in constructing a memorial home at Turner were not paid. Winslow, representing creditors, sued, placed a lien on real property, and subsequently sold three tracts of property belonging to the estate. The court decree yesterday unraveled the respective interest of the litigants who have had their claims in court for several years.

In a semi-annual report of the trustee filed yesterday, in the Turner Memorial home trust, cash totalling \$3492 for the six months, was reported. Of this cash, \$4244 was on hand from the prior report. Expenditures totalled \$5793, including \$1973 paid for taxes and abstracts. Several small tracts of property in the trust have been sold.

Milo C. Ross To Leave For Idaho

Pastor of Salem Heights and Rosedale Churches Finishes Work Here

Milo Clifton Ross will conclude his ministry this Sunday at the Salem Heights Community church in the Friends church here. His closing sermon at 8 p. m. will be entitled "The Last Call." The Rosses, with their baby boy, Stephen, plan to leave for Greenleaf, Idaho, Monday afternoon, where they have accepted a call to the Friends church there.

During his 3 1/2 years' ministry, the Sunday school and morning worship attendance doubled, the evening congregation tripled, and the church has nearly doubled its membership. There have been 103 conversions. A single Christian Endeavor society has grown into three. Through the years, Ross has been active in evangelistic work, and the revival at Salem Heights last winter resulted in the organization of a community church.

Along with the pastorate, Ross has acted as president of the Marion county C. E. Union, head of the Friends young people's work in the northwest, and president of the newly-organized Salem Bible institute. He has served on the faculty of the University of Washington, and camps in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

This last week has seen the completion of an improvement campaign in Rosedale resulting in the painting of the church and a new parsonage, laying a new basement floor in the church, building a fire-place room for the high school, and a kitchen for the ladies, mounting a bell and doing the finishing work left incomplete when the building was erected 16 years ago.
