

Home Stocks Reach 5-Year Highs as Business Pace Quickens

Rails Advance Day's Biggest Profit-Taking Shaken Off For Most Part Though Setbacks Occur

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Business hopes brightened in today's stock market and a wide assortment of leaders pushed into new high territory for the past five years or longer with gains of fractions to 1 or more points.

Buying orders piled up over the weekend and for a while in the first hour the ticker tape was pressed to keep up with floor transactions. With Labor day out of the way, traders appeared to be reanimated by signs of a brisk fall expansion in industry.

There were several profit-taking intervals when the pace slowed appreciably, but the list as a whole shook off realizations without any great difficulty. While there were a number of losers at the finish, and some extreme gains were shaded, the more prominent stocks held around their best levels of the day.

Steels took command at the start, but the iron, oils, rails, coppers and specialties were quick to step well up into the front ranks.

The Associated Press average of 60 issues was ahead .6 of point at 69.2. The rails, up .4, established a peak of 1.06 to date.

Transfers totaled 1,716,000 shares, the largest day's volume since June 29.

COTTON SPURT AND REPORT OF STORMS IN EUROPE ARE ALSO BULLISH

CHICAGO, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Stimulated by Winnipeg wheat market bulks of more than 2 cents a bushel and by the skyrocketing of cotton values, wheat in Chicago averaged higher today.

Upturns of wheat received impetus from reports that violent storms in western Europe were delaying completion of harvest.

Wheat futures in Chicago closed nervous, 1/4-3/4 above Saturday's finish.

Rain on Harvest

Strength that developed in wheat was rendered more notable by the fact that the movement of Canada's new wheat crop is at the season's peak.

Fractional early downturns of wheat prices were promoted by attention given to nearness of the United States government crop report due Sept. 10.

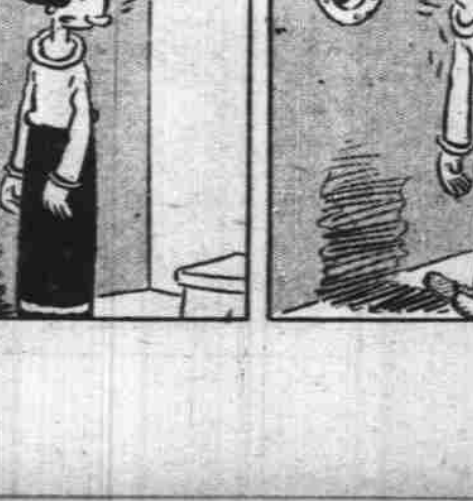

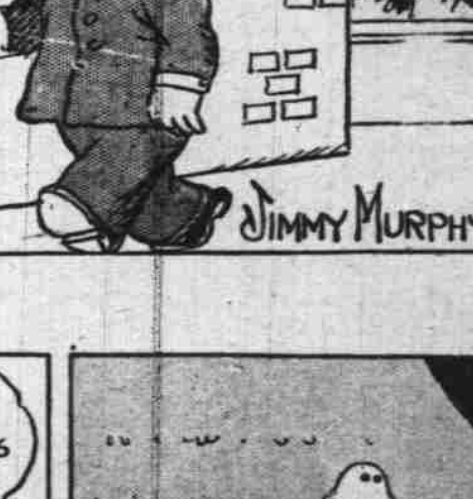
