Historic Play Is at Elsinore

"Mary of Scotland" Brings Hepburn and March to Screen; Real Epic

"Mary of Scotland," starring Fredric March and Katharine Hepburn begins today at the Elsinore theatre.

Mary, Queen of Scots has been a fascinating figure in world history ever since the hour of her birth in 1542, for tragedy raised her to the throne of Scotland through the untimely death of her father, James V, while she still was in her cradle.

The picture takes up the life of Mary of Scotland as she sets sail from France after the death of her first husband, Francis II, bound for Scotland to take her place as queen. Secretly Queen Elizabeth sends a pirate ship to prevent her return to Scotland, but Mary escapes and makes her way to Holyrood castle where she takes over the rule of her country from her scheming half-brother, James Stuart, the Earl of Moray.

Inspired by love of her native land, Mary takes up her reign surrounded by the hostile Scottish lords who have embraced the reformed religion of John Knox. She is aided and comforted only by the counsel of Rizzio, her secretary, and the Earl of Bothwell, a Scottish patriot who has rallied to her cause.

To save Mary's throne, Bothwell agrees to leave the country but after he has gone, the treacherous nobles imprison the queen at Lochleven. She escapes and makes her way to England, believing that Elizabeth will aid her. However, the English queen makes Mary a prisoner at Fotheringay castle, later to falsely accuse her of conspiring to murder Elizabeth. For this Mary is sent to the block, while Bothwell dies in exile, unable to aid his wife and queen.

Kicking shins, hurling tomatoes, busting windows and raising the roof in general, Jane Withers takes time out from her wild pranks to play a half-pint Robin Hood of lower New York in "Pepper," her new picture which opened Saturday at the Grand theatre.

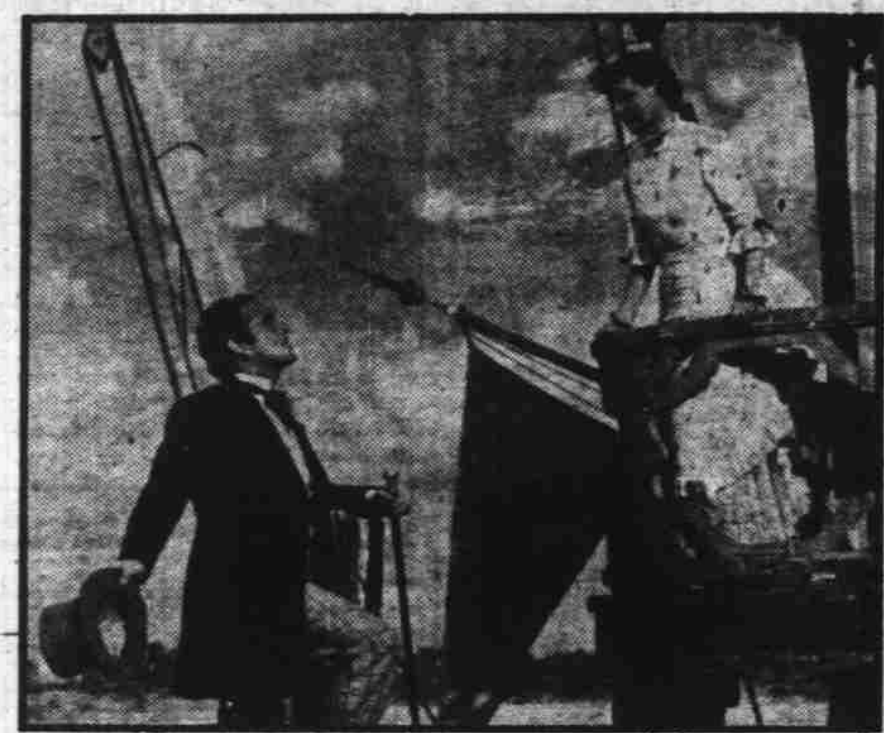
