

Quiet but Persistent Buying Starts Stocks on Upward Trend

Steels, Rails Lead Advance

Slowness of Trading Only Detracting Factor as Average Lifts .4

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—(AP)—Quiet but persistent buying forces got behind the stock market today and rallied recently depressed issues fractions to around 2 points.

Leading the forward push were selected steels, rails, motors, oils, coppers and specialties.

Only the relatively slowness of trading detracted from the satisfaction in brokerage circles over ability of the list to reverse its backward trend.

The Associated Press average of 60 issues was up .4 of a point at 67.3 against a decline of .7 the previous day.

Some trading hesitancy was attributed to the cloudy foreign scene. Reflecting the continued flow of gold from Paris and the continent to London, sterling whirled up to a new 2-year peak before meeting resistance.

Wheat's Early Loss Reversed

Curtailed Estimates Both On Canadian, Southern Crops Given Credit

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—Active buying that developed late today brought about an abrupt advance of wheat prices sharply in contrast with earlier setbacks.

Giving incentive to buyers at the last were curtailed estimates both of Canadian and southern Hemisphere wheat yields, together with reports that Italy is negotiating with Rumania for the purchase of many million bushels of wheat.

Southwest advices that a large business in flour is being done added impetus to the late upturn of wheat values.

Wheat closed firm at the day's top figures, 1/2 to 1 cent above yesterday's finish.

Corn, oats and rye fluctuated mainly in line with wheat. Country offerings of corn were meager.
