HOPEWELL, Oct. 3.—An electric range is being installed at the Craig home near Hubbard.

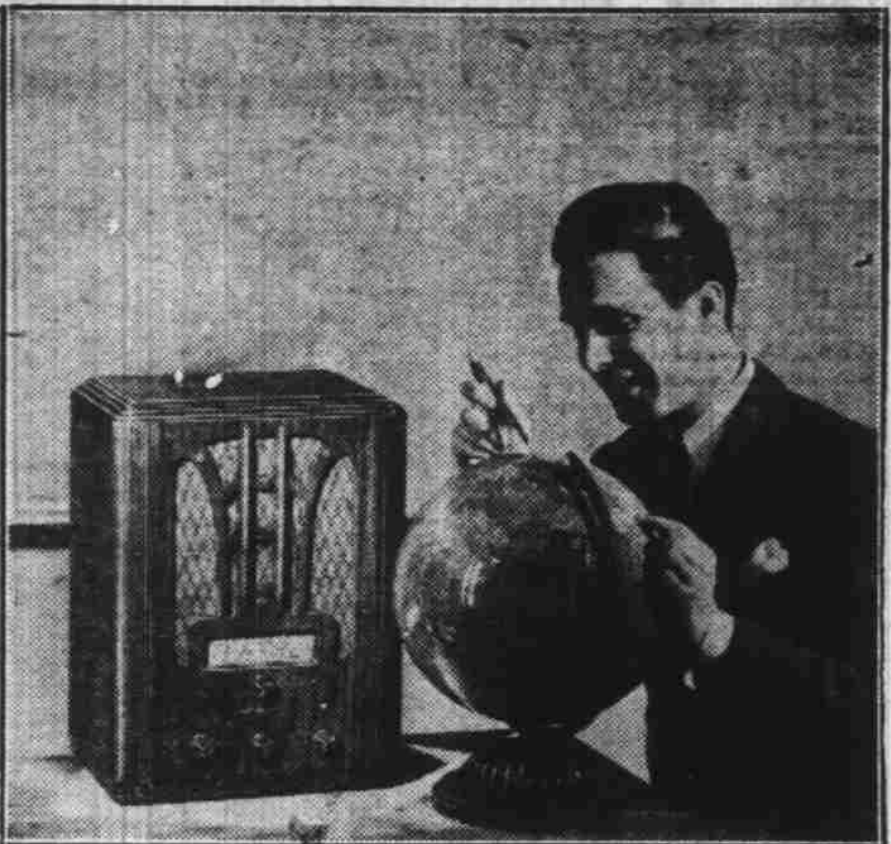
Frank Campbell, of Hopewell, Yamhill county commissioner, who suffered a light stroke of paralysis Monday, is improving at the Portland sanitarium.
