Board Payment Refused—The county court yesterday refused to pay the \$5.43 board bill submitted by Sheriff A. C. Burk for 25 meals served to five of the seven prisoners returned to the county jail under commutation of sentence by Governor Martin. Governor Martin has declared that the county will have to pay the bill. A decision from the attorney general on responsibility of the state and county for the care of the prisoners is expected to be given Monday. The prisoners returned were all sentenced to the penitentiary from Marion county for terms of less than a year.

54 Deaths Recorded—Fifty-four deaths, the same number as in July, were recorded in Marion county in August, the county health department reported. Of the August deaths 33 were male and 21 female. Causes of deaths included heart disease, 14; communicable disease, 7; kidney disease, 6; apoplexy, 4; automobile accidents, 2; cancer and diabetes, one each. There was one maternal and one infant death. Births during August numbered 89 of which 48 were male and 41 female.

Fire Defenses in Good Shape, Held

Politics Blamed by Chief For Criticism; Never Had Breakdown

"Politics" are in part back of criticisms of the Salem fire department's equipment-uptake policy, Fire Chief Harry Hutton charged yesterday as he declared the breakdown a week ago of the Salem truck dispatched to Bandon was unavoidable.

"I don't play politics," Hutton said. "That's the reason they hold."

Hutton pointed out that within the last few months each of the eight fire trucks the city owns had been overhauled at local garages. He said the department's latest repair bill amounted to \$500.

"I've never had any trouble with my trucks in town," the chief added. "I read in the paper that two Portland trucks broke down recently while responding to an alarm down there."

Whereas the Portland fire department has a master mechanic and a shop, "in Salem we have

a monkey wrench and a screw driver," Hutton said.

Criticism of the Salem department was made indirectly by Jack Hayes of the state fire marshal's office in an address before the Salem Credit association Friday.

Democrats Lead New Registrants

Democrats continued to lead in registrations as the lists closed at the county clerk's office at 8 o'clock last night. More than 1,000 voters registered during the day yesterday, U. G. Boyer, county clerk, estimated. Nine clerks

were kept busy taking the signatures up until the closing hour last night.

The figures on the total registration will not be available for at least a week, Boyer said last night. Due to the shortage of help in the department it was impossible to keep a running count of the registrations. In addition to making the count of the voters who have signed up since the primary, each of the cards must be carefully checked, Boyer stated.
