convinced by a thorough study that a public hearing would serve no other purpose than to "smear the president."

Nye Action Praised By Central Figure

Denying he ever had agreed to sell military planes or that he had received anything under an unfulfilled contract with Fokker, 25-year-old Elliott Roosevelt said at Fort Worth, Texas, that he thought Nye had done "exactly the right thing" in making public the deposition.

He said he believed his rights as a private citizen had been infringed, however, and that he intended to go to New York early next week to confer with counsel.

Remarking that "this story comes originally from republican sources," young Roosevelt denied the deposition's statement that he had received \$5,000 under the contract, but he said this sum went to a salesman associated with him.

From G. W. Stratton, sales executive of an airplane manufacturing concern at Santa Monica, Calif., came a statement that he had received \$5,000 for expenses from Fokker in 1934 and that to his knowledge Elliott Roosevelt received nothing.

In response to a direct question at his press conference here, Senator Nye said a sale of military airplanes to the Soviet government might have constituted violation of a United States embargo.

Roosevelt Plans To Invade Kansas

(By the Associated Press)
Stalking the electoral vote of the midwest, President Roosevelt and Governor Landon will set out today on what may be crucial tours in the presidential campaign.

The president heads from Washington for Omaha, where he will speak Saturday, on an itinerary calling for stops in 11 states and several major speeches before he returns to his Hyde Park home on October 17. His topics have yet to be disclosed.

Governor Landon leaves Topeka for Chicago, to speak there tomorrow night on the budget. On Monday he will discuss the civil service at Cleveland, and relief will be his topic Tuesday in Detroit.

Numerous rear platform appearances are planned by both candidates in the more populous areas of such states as Ohio and Michigan.

The Roosevelt schedule will take him into Kansas, the home state of his republican opponent.

Game Supervisor Defends Hunters

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(P)—Frank Wire, Oregon state game supervisor, today came to the defense of deer hunters as various interests continued their efforts to fix the responsibility for the southwestern Oregon fires.

State Forester Ferguson was quoted recently as saying many fires were caused "by carelessness of hunters or incendiaries."

"I don't like to see the hunters vilified," Wire said, "when they are not to blame for the southwestern Oregon fires. I don't believe Mr. Ferguson can prove that a single one of the devastating fires was set by a hunter."

Logging operators were previously accused by C. J. Buck, regional U. S. forester. Logging companies replied that they had been ordered to burn slashings by forestry officials.

Rural Victims of Fire to Have Aid

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(P)—Resettlement Administrator R. G. Tugwell announced today \$50,000 had been allotted to aid farm victims in the fire devastated area of Oregon.

The announcement said \$42,000 of the amount would be for capital goods loans for buildings, fences, farm machinery, loans for feed and grass seed to reseed burned areas. The remaining \$8,000 will be disbursed in direct grants.

It was said a survey by Walter A. Duffy, resettlement regional director, Portland, Ore., showed a large number of farmers had suffered partial or complete loss of pasture and feed resources. The total area burned was estimated between 50,000 and 100,000 acres.

10-Year Sentence Given For Bad Check Writing

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(P)—William T. Dickson, 47, was sentenced today by Judge Stapleton to a ten-year term in the state prison. He pleaded guilty to a bad check charge.

Frank Morgan, 22, received a two-year sentence when he pleaded guilty to charges of burglary not in a dwelling.

Injured Cyclist Dies
VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 7.—(P)—When Delbert Allen Whelan pedaled his bicycle into the side of Edison Johnson's car at a street intersection here Tuesday afternoon he received head injuries which later proved fatal. He died this morning, leaving his widow and small son. Johnson was absolved of blame.

Woods Injury Fatal
ASTORIA, Oct. 7.—(P)—Mike Kaminski, 42, died as result of a fractured skull here late last night. Kaminski, of Washougal, Wash., was fatally injured Tuesday morning when a tree limb fell on his head while he was working in the woods for the Tidewater Timber company.

Mine Tragedy Not Wholly Explained

WALLACE, Idaho, Oct. 7.—(P)—The plunge of 10 miners to their death at the bottom of the Morning mine shaft was described by a coroner's jury today as an "unavoidable accident."

But nothing was found in the inquest which would explain the breaking yesterday of an apparently sound cable causing an elevator cage to fall nearly 900 feet.

Eleven witnesses, including Arthur Campbell, state mine inspector, officials and employees of the Federal Mining and Smelting company, operator of the Morning, testified at the hearing, which lasted more than two hours.

What caused the accident probably never will be known, the jurors were told. J. E. Berg, general superintendent of the Federal company, said the cable, which had been properly inspected, was carrying only one-twelfth of the weight it was designed to support.

Such cables are used for a year before being replaced, he said, and this one had been in service only eight and a half months.

their annual salaries this month. Director Copper contended that but the half-month amount should be given them. He maintained that the remaining two weeks' pay should be withheld until next September 15.

A typical sample contract, adopted as to form by the board last June 25, and made out for a junior high school instructor, reads in pertinent parts as follows:

"... the said teacher is to teach in the jr. high school of the above district for a period of nine (9) school months, commencing on the 14th day of September, 1936; and for such services lawfully and properly rendered said school district agrees to pay the sum of \$1,551.69, the same to be paid as follows: In twelve (12) equal monthly payments commencing on the 5th day of October following the commencement of school, and on the 5th day of each and every month thereafter to including the 5th day of September of the following year..."

Processing Taxes Repayment Fought

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(P)—Federal attorneys prepared today to battle in court to retain about \$1,000,000,000 of processing taxes collected under the outlawed agricultural adjustment act before the supreme court invalidated the law.

Faced by a decision by Federal Judge Luther B. Way at Norfolk, Va., yesterday, that a processor could recover taxes paid prior to the supreme court ruling, new deal legal experts conceded they were confronted by a series of court battles.

Already preparing to appeal the Norfolk decision, attorneys said it was the first against the government on this point. Previously an Alabama federal court had decreed that processors in similar suits, they said.
