Hiram Ridenhour Passes at Albany

ALBANY, Oct. 7.—Hiram Donaldson Ridenhour, 68, died at his home in this city October 4, following a lingering illness. Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the Fisher-Strawn chapel. Rev. E. C. Hicks will have charge of the services, and burial will be in the Houston cemetery.

Ridenhour was born in Gasconade county, Mo., February 23, 1868. In 1888 he came west, living in Washington, where he was employed in logging camps until 1919, when he came to Albany where he has since made his home. Since coming here he was employed in the yard of the Hammond Lumber company until 1933 when he retired.

Ridenhour was twice married. The first time to Carrie May Burnside of Albany in 1919. She died in 1925, and in 1924 he married Addie Davis of Albany, who died in 1933. One sister, Mrs. Alice Woolridge of Albany survives.

Contests Foreseen in City Offices At Election in Scio on November 3; One Slate of Officers Already in

SCIO, Oct. 7.—Seventeen signers, represented to be legal voters of the city of Scio, have petitioned the city council to call an election to fill the offices of one mayor and six councilmen at the general election to be held November 3 this year, together with recorder and treasurer. No nomination was made for city marshal, which also is an elective office.

Those proposed for municipal officers are: Mayor, P. W. Schunk; councilmen, Frank Barlow, Jr., Fred Bryan, N. I. Morrison, A. G. Prill, J. A. Withers and W. Z. Sims; recorder, O. B. Cyrus; treasurer, E. D. Myers. Bryan, Morrison, Cyrus, and Myers are incumbents.

The present mayor and council have held office for several years, as no election has been held for some time. Officers elected some years ago are expected to serve "until their successors are elected and qualified," hence they are

hold-overs unless they resign or otherwise vacate their offices. W. A. Ewing is the present mayor; Fred Bryan, W. J. Chromy, W. F. Gill, N. I. Morrison, A. L. Plummer, and Fred Rosdarmel, councilmen; O. B. Cyrus, recorder; E. D. Myers, treasurer; and Fred Daley, marshal.

Accompanying the petitions of candidates were also certificates to the effect that they would qualify and serve if elected to the respective offices. This is required by the city charter.

The petition for signatures for the new setup, which was circulated by J. D. Denmore, sr., contained the names of 17 citizens. There is mention of placing another part or complete ticket in the field, period within which to do this extending to within 10 days prior to November 3. It has been many years since more than one ticket was before the city electorate.
