The student paper, The Popcorn Popper which was much enjoyed last year by school patrons will not be published this year.

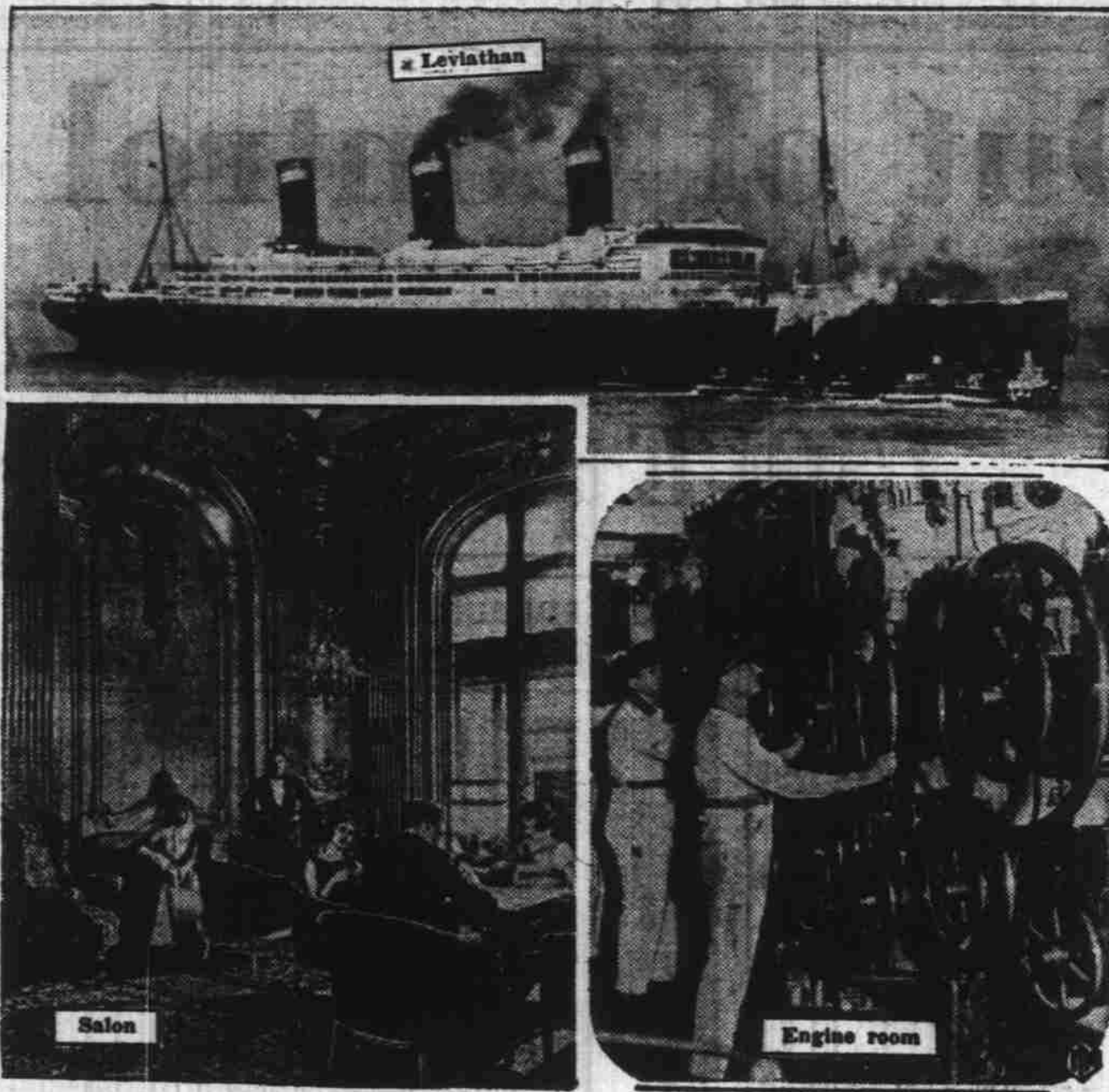
Long Beach People Buy 50-Acre Ladstock Farm in Dallas District

History of Huge Leviathan Near End



Another chapter in the colorful history of the giant liner, Leviathan, once queen of the seas, is about to be written. After more than 30 years of service, the Leviathan is apparently headed for the wrecking yard or for use as a training ship. For the past two years this ocean greyhound has lain idle at her pier in Hoboken. Operators of the ship lost more than \$500,000 in 1933, the last year she was used as a transatlantic ferry. The Leviathan

was launched in 1913 as the Vaterland, built by Germany at Hamburg. Interned by United States at Hoboken when war broke out, the ship was used as a troop transport and after the war recommissioned for transatlantic service. But construction of faster modern ships in the past decade displaced the Leviathan as queen of the seas and the historic boat is apparently at the end of her career.

Corn Yield at Lebanon High

52 Bushels Produced on Half Acre; Filbert Crop Is Large

LEBANON, Oct. 10.—Lyman Fitzwater of Beaver Swale reports raising 52 bushels of corn on a half acre of creek bottom land.

The E. B. Edes nut plant is employing two crews drying, cleaning and grading filberts which are arriving from about 1000 acres comprised in the filbert association. Nearly 100 tons will be handled this year, showing an increase in the past 12 years of 600 per cent.
