The Townsend plan, he said, fails to distinguish between money and wealth. It would give 10 million persons or 8 per cent of the people, 24 billion dollars per year to be converted immediately into goods and services. The greatest aggregate wealth this country has ever produced, in 1929, was 79 billion dollars, which means that under the Townsend plan 30 per cent of the wealth would be in the hands of 8 per cent of the people, or in other words, it would tax 30 per cent of all production to pay the bill.

Huey Long Plan Lives
The Share-the-Wealth plan, the theory of which Jones argued will not be silenced with the death of Huey Long, is based on an idea which falls to consider that there is not that much, \$3000 to \$5000 per person, wealth in the country, but rather only \$675 per person.

Of the New Deal, and especially the Triple A, Jones declared "It is a marvelous plan for the farmers; a magnificent plan for transferring money from the pockets of city folks into the pockets of country folks."

"There is no substitute in economic organization under a democracy for an intelligent citizenship," Jones said in suggesting his own ideas on how to right the economic structure.

His suggestions, predicated upon a capitalistic system which he holds best for this country, are, briefly: Intelligent citizenship; elimination of all those things which destroy wealth, as for instance war; control of the business cycle; elimination of those who do not produce wealth; utmost development of productive capacities of the people; socialization of public utilities; and a more equitable tax system.

Canneries Remain On Full Schedule

Tomatoes, pumpkins and pears are keeping Salem canneries going on full schedule even though harvesting of most of the crops has been completed. Hunt Brothers is the only local cannery which has finished its run of pears.

At the Starr plant one of the longest runs of tomatoes ever experienced is now in its ninth successive week. The pack is expected to run to October 20 unless frost or heavy rains puts the picking at an end. This has been a highly successful season for the harvesting of tomatoes.

At the Oregon Packing company plant pears are being worked along with pumpkins. This pack is expected to last for another 10 days or two weeks. The pack has been running for three weeks.

The cannery had a larger acreage of squash under contract this year but the size of the pack may be offset some by unfavorable growing conditions for the crop which made the yield per acre less than usual.

Work Progressing On Highway South

Five and Half Millions in Projects' Cost, Says Engineer Baldoek

The Pacific highway realignment program covering that part of the road extending from Salem south to the California line is fast being whipped into shape, R. H. Baldoek, state highway engineer, reported Monday.

Heaviest construction is between Canyonville and Grants Pass, including four mountain summit projects.

Projects now under construction or completed represent an expenditure of \$5,500,000. Improvements on the Wolf creek, State Road pass, Canyonville summit and Sexton mountain summits will cost \$10,000,000, Baldoek said.

Five fronts are under attack in the program as follows:

From the Oregon state line to Siskiyou station, 6 1/2 miles tunnel under the summit, estimated to cost \$800,000, not under contract. Ten mile stretch from Siskiyou station to Ashland, which will shorten the present route by four miles. Cost \$1,000,000. This work is either completed or under contract. Section between Ashland and Grants Pass, on which \$700,000 already has been expended.

Some Not Awarded
Kelly's Corner-Shady Point overcrossing on South Roseburg section, under contract at cost of \$240,000. Winston bridge to cost \$160,000. Work within city of Roseburg, \$122,000, for which the contract has not been awarded. Shady Point-Roseburg section, estimated to cost \$300,000, and not yet budgeted.

Turkey Hill and Rice Hill improvements on North Roseburg section, at cost of \$220,000. Connection between the two hill improvements, not yet budgeted. This improvement was estimated to cost \$100,000. Rice Hill to Oakland, estimated to cost \$230,000, but not yet included in the budget.

Eugene-Junction City improvement to cost \$850,000. Contract awarded. Equal amount to be required later to complete the project.

Salem-Taylor creek section and undercrossing at cost of \$311,000. Undercrossing now being constructed north of Salem at cost of \$300,000.

Giant Squash on Display, Chamber

The Salem chamber of commerce's display of grains and vegetables grown in Marion county yesterday received a new "center-piece." It is a 175-pound squash grown on Santiam soil by Oscar Stahl at West Slayton.

The squash brought to the chamber by Roy Rice, who with A. A. Geer had charge of the Marion county booth at the Pacific International Livestock exposition in Portland. There it topped an attractive stair-step arrangement of fruits and vegetables.

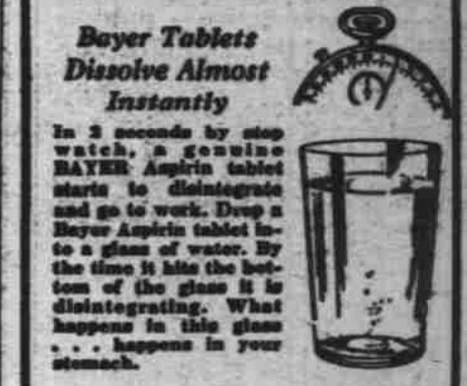

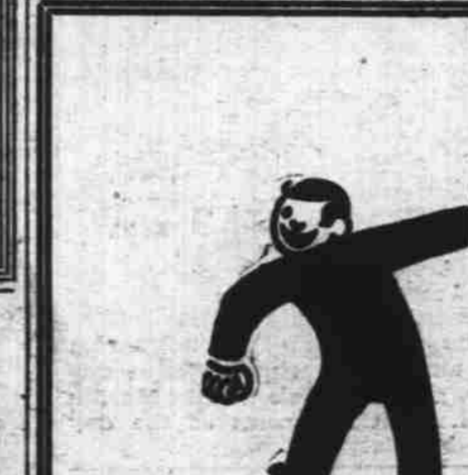
